Tornado Cuts Devastating Path, Leaves Many Employees Homeless

It was late afternoon on Tuesday, May 6. Storm clouds had been plaguing the Omaha area all day. But now the sky was really getting dark.

There was a general uneasiness among those employees working in the Plant who had caught a glimpse of the weather that afternoon. The Weather Bureau had issued a tornado watch. Following regular procedure, a security guard had been stationed on the roof of Building 20 to watch the threatening sky.

Then everything happened almost at once. A tornado was spotted in the skies southwest of the Plant. The city's civil defense sirens began to blare the warning, followed quickly by the in-Plant alarm. Works employees rushed for shelter then waited and listened while sketchy reports began to tell the frightening story.

This tornado, unlike any other the city had experienced in the past 62 years, overstayed its visit. The gigantic twister had cut a devastating swath across 2,000 city blocks

leaving in its wake three dead, hundreds injured and hundreds of millions of dollars in damage.

Dozens of Omaha Works employees lost homes and apartments or sustained serious damage. Among them was Bill Steinbach, Department 144, whose house at 7030 Western Avenue was totally destroyed.

Bill probably spoke for many employees adversely affected by the storm when he said, "Would you please say something in your story about how I really appreciate the help I've received from so many of the people who work here."

Those employees who were fortunate enough to escape the storm's wrath pitched in to help as much as they could. Many spent long, back-breaking hours helping to clear the debris. Hundreds of Works employees deposited clothing in the Goodwill collection boxes which had been set up at various Plant entrances following the disaster.


Lease Is Extended On 613 Building
