

Denver's "Amp-Pull Quality" QWL/EI team members Barb Froelich, Peggy Cornish and Diane Watson discuss cable manufacturing with Omaha's Bill Brink of IBU 552-4.

Nine members of the "Amph-Pull Quality" QWL/EI team from AT&T's Denver Works visited the Omaha Works Nov. 8-10 to discuss quality issues with employees and to see firsthand the manufacturing process in the Bldg. 50 cable shop. Omaha's 810-A sheath cable is used in products manufactured at the Denver Works.

The Denver team was hosted by the certification team in IBU 552 (large cable rewind and test). Operators from each process donned "Quality is our First Concern" T-shirts and served as tour guides

and process experts as the Denver group followed the manufacture of 810-A cable from beginning to end.

Efforts are underway to strengthen the Omaha/Denver supplier/customer relationship. As a result of the visit, a monthly teleconference call will be held to discuss quality issues. A team of Omaha employees from the various processes will be formed to provide our Denver customer direct contact with the manufacturing floor. Several suggestions for specific changes are being also investigated.

DICK CEFREY (IBU 581) reports a significant change in the way employees of the 80-type cabinet final assembly area and the painting/plating room work together.

"The painting/plating room is SEQUENCING metal fabrication parts for the 80-type cabinets," says Section Chief DICK KUSMIERSKI. All the metal fab parts needed to make one 80-type cabinet are collected and placed on a cart by employees in the painting/plating room. When they're ready to put together a cabinet, operators in the 80-type assembly area wheel the cart containing all the metal parts for a particular cabinet from the paint room to the assembly area.

This technique is also known as KITTING and is a superb example of a PULL system in the just-in-time manufacturing process. This technique reduces work-in-process inventory by eliminating the need to have a variety of metal fab parts available on the floor at all times. It also reduces the time spent getting all the parts together in one location in the assembly area. The system was implemented in mid-November.

Officials of Bellcore--the telecommunications manufacturing watchdog for the regional bell operating companies--will be doing a quality program evaluation (QPE) at the Omaha Works during the second quarter of 1990.

The purpose of the audit, according to J. L. Pete Pence, assistant vice president of Bellcore, is to see that Omaha's products are "technically complete, professionally done, reasonably priced and done on schedule."

Pence addressed a group of Omaha Works employees recently, saying "Quality is really the only major differentiation among companies. Omaha is perceived to be in the weaker group in terms of quality, yet the quality of your products

isn't bad. It's a perception problem. You need to make quality a part of your culture, because the media division faces lots of competition."
