# BROTHER AND SISTER UNION MEMBERS:

CONTINUED LAYOFFS WRACK OMAHA WORKS

Less than twenty-four hours after reassuring both the Local Union and employees that layoffs were not in the immediate future, Local Western Electric management officials announced hourly work force layoffs of 175 employees effective November 19th. This most recent layoff which becomes effective less than one week before the Thanksgiving Holiday period was unexpected in both numbers and timeliness.

As a point of interest and in order to clear up a common misunderstanding throughout the Plant, the Company is not required by contract to give advance notice to the Union of an impending layoff.

In fact, just the opposite is true in most cases! The Union is informed of layoffs and other force adjustments scant minutes before the employees and/or the news media are informed.

In the current 175 layoffs, for example, the Union was notified at 9:20 a.m. Friday, November 12th.

For the past several weeks, the Union had heard rumors throughout the shop of an announcement to take place on November 12th. When questioned about these rumors, various levels of management denied any knowledge of an announcement to take place on November 12.

In any event, the Union learned of the layoffs approximately 40 minutes before the announcement was made in the shop work areas.

This most recent layoff resulted in employees with almost thirteen years service (E.S.D. January, '70) being laid off! It's my understanding that last week's total layoffs for the entire Western Electric Company numbered in excess of 3000 employees.

The Local Western Electric management has stated no more layoffs between now and the end of the year. However, I will caution everyone to take this Company forecast with a grain of salt in view of what I'll charitably term as past inaccuracies.

#### SAVINGS AND SECURITY PLAN WITHDRAWAL

Members who so desire have only eleven days left to opt for withdrawal of 1980 monies in the Savings and Security Plan.

Anyone electing to withdraw their 1980 Savings and Company contribution must complete form SN 1019 and return same to the Western Electric payroll office no later than Tuesday, November 30th.

This form SN 1019 may be delivered by mail or hand delivered to the payroll organization.

Employees who opt to withdraw the 1980 savings will receive a verification of their request from the Company no later than Friday, December 10th. If you elected to withdraw the 1980 monies and you do not receive this notification by December 10th, you must notify the payroll organization by Friday, December 17th, in order to be eligible for your 1980 withdrawal.

Participants in the Local Union Savings and Security Plan will receive their annual statements in February, 1983, and will receive their periodic partial distribution checks  $\underline{\text{NO}}$  later than March 1st.

#### VISION CARE PLAN

Effective January 1, 1983, a negotiated Vision Care Plan will be provided to all Western Electric employees and certain of their dependents.

This new benefit which was negotiated into the 1980 contract is found on Page 201 of your contract.

To date, the most common question I hear on this new benefit involves the local Western Electric Company safety glass program and the new Vision Care Plan.

Employees may, if they so choose, apply safety store designer classes against the benefits provided for in the new Vision Care Plan not to exceed the schedule of benefits.

Additionally, information on the Vision Care Plan will be forthcoming in the December issue of the "Short Circuit" newspaper.

However, in order to assist you now in planning for your families' future vision care needs, the following scheduled dollar amounts are applicable for service and materials once in a twenty-four month period.

### POTSHOT FROM THE CHAMBER

Know what causes unemployment? Unemployment insurance, that's what.

How do you solve it? Simple, says Richard Lesher, president of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce: "You make it less attractive for people to sit on their A- -."

A lot of people "are making an art of going into the work force long enough to qualify for unemployment," Lesher told San Francisco Chronicle reporter Harre W. Demoro last week. "If you don't give them a big unemployment check they will get off their a - - and go to work."

Lesher's theory is being market-tested by 7.1 million jobless Americans --63 percent of the 11.3 million total -- who get no unemployment benefits at all. Among the 4.2 million who do, the average benefit is \$115 a week. In 21 states, maximum benefits are set well below minimum wage levels.

In the statement made before the November 2nd election, Lesher also said he expects 80 of the 100 Chamber-backed "pro-business" candidates to win in next Tuesday's elections. No way will there be heavy Republican losses in the House," he said. "It might even be 'a wash."

That's because "unemployment is what the liberals are crying about the most. The fact is that unemployment affects only a small part of the population."

While Lesher pontificated, 70,000 San Franciscans were preparing to march in a pre-election rally for jobs and justice. In New York City, 2,000 job hunters were camped outside a Carpenters Union hall where they waited up to four days to apply for 400 apprenticeships that will open up over the next two years.

And in Washington, 35 more newly unemployed people, caught in a second wave of layoffs at the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, were weighing their exboss's views from a new perspective.
