
We should examine the reason why this Local Union has been able to play such a large part in the successful development of the IBEW Western Electric Council.

We should examine the reason why this Local Union has been able to maintain such a high percentage of membership in a state where the law compels the Union to represent all employees in the bargaining unit, while exempting those same employees from any responsibility to contribute to the support of that Union.

We should examine the reason why this Local Union has Wage Incentive and Job Grades committees that are not only highly suc-

### Seal Designed to Mark Anniversary

The above seal was designed by our Short Circuit staff artist and union representative James Curran, commemorating the tenth anniversary of Local 1974.

The colors on the new official seal are red, blue, gold, black and white.

The entwined circular rope and clenched fist tie in with the International emblem because we are affiliated with the IBEW.

The word "Unity" was placed on the wrist-band to denote strength and on the lightening bolt, which denotes electricity, are the words "Security" and "Dignity" reflecting what our Local strives to obtain for its members.

In the inner circle the date the Union was chartered can be seen and below is the city in which our Local Union was founded.

The bold letters "L. U. 1974" and IBEW proudly display the name of a proud Local Union and International Brotherhood.

This is the seal of a proud people united for security and dignity.

## Garrity Reflects On Campaign Of '56-'57

by Robert K. Garrity (International Vice-President)

Remembered most vividly was the fine cooperation and helpfulness that was extended to the Organizers by so many people that were employed by Western Electric pilot plants in the old Sidles Building on 19th St., and at 16th and Cuming. The Organizers who initiated the plan were John P. Daly of New York City who had considerable experience with Western Electric organizing campaigns and myself.

Later on, during negotiations in

the Spring of 1957, International Representative Joe Boki was present and did a very commendable job in helping us negotiate the first contract.

Because there were so many people involved and so much credit should be extended, I am not going to name names of employees for fear of forgetting some. Many of you, of course, know that members who are now serving your Local Union, or have served as officers, stewards and so on, took an extremely important part in this campaign. Most of our work had to be done in off hours and there was a lot of doorbell ringing and phone calling during the evening and on Saturdays and Sundays.

There was intense rivalry with other Unions and this was finally resolved after a National Labor Relations Board Hearing to one other Union, other than the IBEW. At some juncture during this intense campaign, several Unions were involved and were attempt-

## 1957 - THE BIRTH OF A UNION

### Lowell Iske Elected First President of Local

At the first membership meeting called on March 8, 1957 with Robert K. Garrity, International Representative presiding, the members cast their ballots to elect the first president of Local 1974.



After the ballots were counted, Lowell Iske was found to be the winner and our Union had its first leader. During his first year of office the first contract committee was formed and consisted of Iske, Gene Sautter, Larry Hooker, Frank Vondra, Paul Elvers and the International Representatives, J. E. Boki and Robert Garrity.

The first contract between the Union and Western Electric was ratified by the membership on May 17, 1957.

Also in that first year of Iske's reign as President, the membership voted to increase the Union dues by an additional \$.50. The vote was 50 for and 28 against.

The early meetings were held at the Rome Hotel which has since been destroyed.

Iske remained our President for two years, up until April 2, 1959.


It was reported in the December, 1961 issue that all attending the dance had an enjoyable time. It was estimated that over 600 people attended.

At the regular business meeting in February a proposal was made ing 369 votes followed by Paul Elto increase the Union dues fifty cents and bring it up to three dollars per month.

According to President Rustermier, a fifty cent increase would have covered only a bare minimum on expense increases.

On May 18, 1962, the membership voted to increase the dues and set up a building fund. This went into effect on July 1, 1962.

### SAAB REPORTS ON **PRE-NEGOTIATIONS SCHOOL**


A school for workers at the University of Wisconsin on pre-negotiations was announced by Eugene Saab.



### Uncovered: 85 **Employes** Suspended

An investigation by the Company resulted in a loss of 144 days pay for 85 members of the bargaining unit. Disciplinary action of a one day suspension for 79 people and ranging from three days to eight weeks for the other six, was imposed by the Company. The investigation which was started by the plant protection personnel uncovered evidence of gambling on the Company property.

In the course of the investigaton, a 100 number football pool was discovered and the employees whose names appeared on it were interrogated. Others not directly involved in this pool were also questioned in regard to other kinds of gambling activity.

Orders were given by Company officials to fire all 85 participants. The Union urged that this action was far too severe.

The Convention was in session five full working days, two of which extended beyond the hour set for adjournment. President Freeman complimented the delegates on their punctuality in attendance at all the sessions.



At a special meeting called on Sunday, June 12 at the Stockehange Building the m mip rejected the proposed \$1.50 increase in the Union dues. Only 199 members turned out to vote on this important proposed by-law

The vote was 126 against, 72 for and 1 void ballot.

There was heated discussion on the matter and after both sides had been heard from, a vote was taken.

Two months later another special meeting was called at the same site pertaining again to a dues increase.

This time the outcome was different. With slightly more members in attendance, a revised version of a dues increase passed by a vote of 112 to 102.

### Contract Ratified at Civic Auditorium Meeting

The Civic Auditorium was the ite of the ratification meeting on unday, November 20th. The members turned out 2,187 strong, the largest attendance in the history of our local for a special meeting, to accept the Company offer. The vote was 1,506 for and 668 against with thirteen ballots void-

President Vondra called the meeting to order and after a brief talk, he turned the microphone over to Thomas Hickman, the International Representative, who spoke on the negotiations.

The changes in the articles of the contract were thoroughly explained by the different members of the negotiating committee. One of the most complex articles was article 16, Wage Incentives. Ron Hallett, chairman of this committee, stated that over seventy hours were spent on this article alone during the many weeks of negotia-

After the changes were explained, the members were then allowed the use of the six microphones in the auditorium to express themselves. After several members had asked questions and stated their opinions, a motion was raised from the floor by Harry McKnight to end discussions. His motion was seconded and the membership voted to end discussion. This was followed by the vote to either accept or reject the contract.

The acceptance of the contract ruled out the need for a strike

President Vondra announced the outcome of the election and the meeting was adjourned shortly after 4:30 P.M.



ing to get their names on the ballot. There was a lot of fast talking on the part of the IBE:V Organizers to make very sure that not more than one other Union would be a party to the election. To split up an organization as big as the one at Western Electric, or as big as it was to become, would have been a tragic thing for all of the employees.

I can remember the warm Fall days when the campaign was first initiated and the terrific cold and snow and sleet when it finally ended. It began in September, 1956 and was finally concluded with an election in March of 1957. There was no permanent officer set-up, there was no permanent office set-up, for the Local Union, in fact, no Local Union had been organized until after the campaign was won. As a central meeting place we used the old Rome Hotel on 16th Street which is now a parking lot. We also used a bar across the street from the pilot plant at 16th and Cuming, and in both instances we would meet informally and talk over the days happenings and plot strategy for coming days and weeks during this GRAND LOCAL UNION. campaign.

Many of you can remember how our handbilling duties began at 4:30 A.M., and would continue to about 9:00 A.M.
