FELLOW UNION MEMBERS:

I.B.E.W. Local Union 1974 has received a fact sheet from IBEW International President Charles H. Pillard which demonstrates dramatically and succinctly the damage which the Reagan Administration had done to our federal labor laws. The fact sheet represents an important message which must reach all of Local 1974 members, so you can fully understand how your legal protections have already suffered under the Reagan Administration and how much more damage will be done if Ronald Reagan is reelected.

The following fact sheet states what the Reagan Administration is doing to our labor laws:

Local Unions and their members who have been fortunate enough to avoid litigation under the Reagan Administration may not realize how much damage that Administration has done to the legal rights of workers and their unions in less than 4 years, and how much more damage will be done if there is a second Reagan Administration. The purpose of this fact sheet is to advise you of the labor law policies of the Reagan Administration.

- 1. Most of the federal administrative agencies have been staffed with Reagan appointees with a clear anti-union bias. The Department of Labor is one such example. Among other actions hostile to organized labor and to workers, the Labor Department has done the following:
 - a. It has issued regulations designed to destroy the effectiveness of the Davis-Bacon Act and the Service Contracts Act, which protect our wage rates on federally financed work.
 - b. It has virtually stopped the funding for and the enforcement of our Federal health and safety laws.
 - c. It has turned its union auditing program from one of assistance to unions into a criminal witch hunt directed at union officials.
- The situation at the National Labor Relations Board is even worse. Three of the present four Board members are Reagan appointees. Almost every week, there is a new anti-labor decision by the Reagan Board that reverses earlier Board decisions which had upheld union and worker rights. Here are just a few examples of the anti-labor, anti-worker decisions of the Reagan NLRB.
 - An employer no longer has to bargain about a decision to relocate bargaining unit work unless the decision "turns on" labor costs. (Otis Elevator).

- b. Even if a relocation decision does turn on labor costs, an employer no longer needs the union's consent - even in midcontract term - to transfer unit work to a non-union plant. (Milwaukee Spring).
- c. An employer no longer violates the Act by refusing to reinstate a sympathy striker, after her unconditional offer to return to work, even though the collective bargaining agreement states that it is not cause for discipline if an employee refuses to cross a picket line at the employer's place of business. (Butterworth-Manning-Ashmore Mortuary).
- d. Verbal threats alone, directed by a striker to a non-striker, but unaccompanied by physical acts or gestures, may now be sufficiently serious misconduct to warrant a denial of reinstatement. Thus, a verbal exclamation in the heat of the picket line may now cost a striker his or her job. (Clear Pine Mouldings).
- e. In a large number of cases, where the parties have a broad arbitration clause in their bargaining agreement, the Board will no longer even consider unfair labor practice charges filed against an employer. Under the new rule, you must take your case to arbitration. (United Technologies, Olin Corp.).

In short, the NLRB is no longer an objective forum where we can hope to succeed with our complaints against employers. It is critical to remember that the next President will be in a position, within 8 months, to appoint 2 new Board members and perhaps the General Counsel of the Board as well.

3. Most critical of all is the situation at the Supreme Court of the United States. There are nine Supreme Court Justices. Four of the nine - including the one Reagan appointee so far - are basically hostile to labor and usually vote against our position. In a study of 17 labor cases decided by the Supreme Court last year, this conservative, anti-labor, block of four was shown to have voted together in 16 of the cases.

As difficult as the situation is now in the Supreme Court, it could soon be far worse. Five of the nine justices are over 75 years old. All or most of them are likely to retire or die within the next four years. If Ronald Reagan has the opportunity to appoint even two or three more Supreme Court Justices, Labor can virtually write off the Supreme Court for the next 20-25 years. That would be a catastrophe that we cannot afford.

There are many reasons for defeating Ronald Reagan in November. But none is more compelling that the need to halt the stripping away of the legal rights of unions and their members.

MONTHLY MEETING

STATE AFL-CIO HIRED COORDINATOR

The Nebraska State AFL-CIO has hired Richard Lombardi, a member of IBEW Local Union 244 in Lincoln, to work as a political and registration coordinator through the general election in November.

It is virtually important in the upcoming election to have <u>ALL MEMBERS</u> of Local 1974 registered and have every member vote on Tuesday, November 6, 1984. If we don't support candidates that have been endorsed by Nebraska State AFL-CIO, we will be losing a lot of our resources and strength that labor is capable of having.

Rich will be meeting with the Cope Committee of Local 1974 in the near future to discuss registration and get out to vote campaigns. The Committee will be making phone calls in the near future to members who are not registered. Following are key voter registration dates:

- 10/2/84 Absent, disabled and confined voters ballots to be ready for distribution. (Not less than 35 days prior to the general election).
- 10/26/84 Last day for voter registration prior to general election. (Second Friday preceding election 6:00 p.m.).
- 11/2/84 Last day for absent, disabled or confined voter to apply for ballots to be delivered outside the county by use of the U. S. Mail 4:00 p.m. Friday before election.
- 11/5/84 Last day for a person to vote absentee ballots in the office of the County Clerk or Election Commissioner before leaving the county 4:00 p.m.
- 11/6/84 General Election. Last day for absent, disabled or confined voter to have his agent personally pick-up his ballots.

 12:00 noon. Because of wording in 32-803, an absent voter may have an agent picking up his ballots. Be sure agent of absent voter is instructed to personally deliver and return the ballots.

 Last day for absent voter out of county to cast his/her ballot by absentee voting.

Also following, are some voter registration questions and answers:

WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO VOTE?

Any American citizen over 18 years of age by election day.

WHAT IS THE LAST DAY TO REGISTER TO VOTE?

October 26, 1984

WHEN DOES A MEMBER NEED TO RE-REGISTER TO VOTE?

You only need to re-register if you change your name, address or political party. You do not need to re-register if you failed to vote in a previous election.

IF A MEMBER IS DISABLED OR GOING TO BE OUT OF TOWN ON ELECTION DAY, CAN THEY VOTE?

Yes, you can make special arrangements to vote early. Call your County Clerk at the Courthouse for details where you live.

HOW CAN A MEMBER CHECK TO SEE THAT THEIR REGISTRATION IS UP-TO-DATE?

Have the member call the County Clerk at the Courthouse.

WHERE DO I GO TO REGISTER TO VOTE?

You can register during regular office hours (8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. or 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.) Monday through Friday in the County Clerk's office. Also, you can register to vote at any public library.

ARE THERE SPECIAL TIMES AND PLACES TO REGISTER TO VOTE?

Yes, each county has scheduled special sites and times for your convenience. Call your County Clerk for times and places.

WHERE DO MEMBERS GO TO VOTE ON ELECTION DAY?

Watch your local newspaper for the voting places or call the County Clerk's office for the address of your voting place.

CAN MEMBERS REGISTER TO VOTE AND VOTE ABSENTEE AT THE SAME TIME?

Yes, provided they think they might be out of town on election day and they register between October 2nd and October 26th.
