Terry Kamino Recovering from Hit-and-Run Accident

It's going to be a while before senior engineer Terry Kamino (Dept. 586), can get out for a game of golf. Terry, who is also an avid racquet-



ball player, suffered a broken ankle, arm and nose when he was hit by a truck while jogging on the night of March 26.

The good news is that Terry is recovering from his injuries and expects to be out of the hospital and back home by the time this issue hits the newsstands. The bad news is that the driver of the truck that hit Terry left the scene of

KAMINO the accident and is being sought by Omaha police.

The accident happened at about 9:30 p.m. at 136th and B streets (just across from A & L Mid West Laboratories). We asked Terry to give us some of the details of the accident. Perhaps we can help the police locate the driver of the truck.

Terry said he was running east facing traffic when the truck came toward and hit him, point of impact being the right front quarter of the truck. The driver got out and came to Terry and asked if he needed assistance, then left.

Terry said he lay there for about 15 minutes, thinking the driver had gone for help. No ambulance came, nor did the driver return. Somehow, Terry managed to crawl over to the laboratories building where someone called for emergency assistance.

Terry gave this description of the truck driver to police: White male about 40 years old with curly hair. He was driving a yellow or brownish-color Ford pickup truck. There should be damage to the right rear-view mirror of the truck.

Anyone who has information that may help to find the driver and/or the truck should call the Omaha police hit-and-run department at 444-5626.




