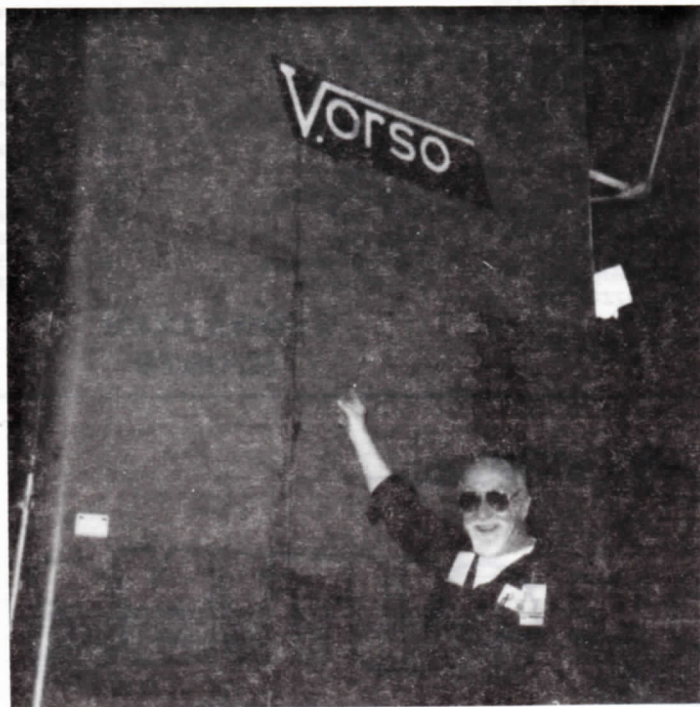

Spring Sees Start-up of Several Weoma Sports

The Outdoor Sports director for the Weoma Club reported at the April 9 board meeting that several associated clubs are ready to begin the 1991 season.

Darwin Fager reported that the Weoma Bicycle Club is functioning now that warm weather has arrived. Some road rides are being planned.

The softball teams are preparing for their opening games according to Tom Furst, league president. He said there are four teams for 1991 as opposed to six in 1990. Furst and Jim Spudich met with the directors to discuss the softball program.

Kurt Vandergriend, president of the Weoma Men's Golf, reported through the director that approximately 240 golfers will participate in the several Weoma Club leagues. He said play will begin this week for some leagues. Mixed League golf has ten teams ready to play and rosters are still being prepared. Start-up is April 22.

The roster is being finalized for the Women's Golf League, according to Susan Addison, club secretary. The league begins play at Eagle Run on April 30.

The Weoma Sportsmen's Club, led by Bill Peters for the past eight years, continues to keep a 12-month per year program running smoothly. Peters was commended by director Fager at the recent board meeting for his exceptional leadership.

In other sports news, John Pinkerton was named chairman of the Weoma Ski Club, replacing Fager. Terese Sakalas is the new vice president and Jim Kelly will serve as treasurer.

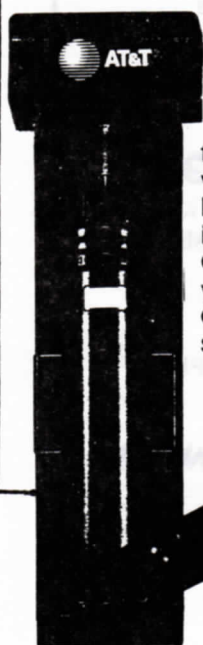

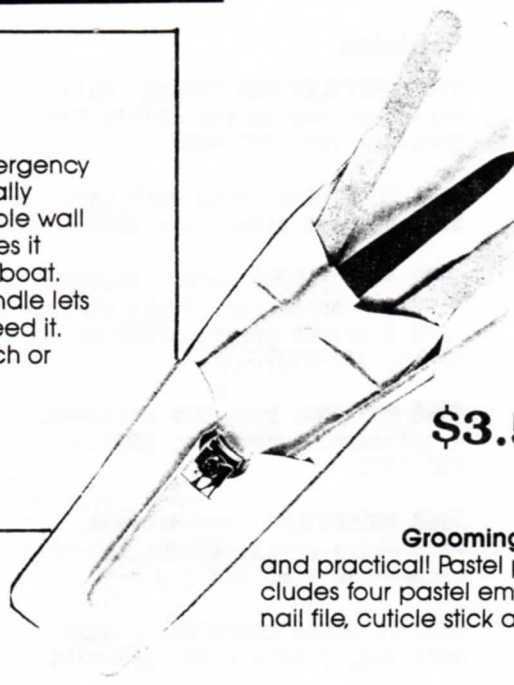
