Mountain Climbers Beset by Winter-like Conditions

Early on August 3, nineteen AT&T employees and one retiree met in Estes Park, Colorado to be briefed on the details of the trail that leads up to the 14, 256' summit of Longs Peak. An additional sixteen family members brought the total number of climbers to thirty-six.

The 4:05 a.m. briefing saw stars overhead but soon the clouds rolled in. By 9:30 a.m. the rain changed to sleet at the 13,000' mark. At 11:15 a.m., as several climbers reached the 13,750' level, Darwin Fager (climb organizer) advised all climbers to get off the mountain immediately.

"The people were well prepared and spirits remained high with thirty-two of thirty-six reaching the popular destination called 'The Keyhole', elevation 13,200'. Of those, twenty made it to the 13,700' level of the Dreaded Trough while ten hardy and aggressive types actually made the 14,256' summit before the event was called at 11:15 a.m.," according to Fager.

By 6:00 p.m. all climbers were safely back at the base area with no falls or injuries reported. Fager said a post-trip meeting will be held after work on Thursday, August 15 at 4:05 p.m. in the Pioneer Room.

Don Roach, Dept. 582, may share his experiences on the North Face as a technical climber lead by a professional mountaineer.

FLAT TIRE?

Having a flat tire when driving is always a problem. But experiencing a flat or blowout while traveling on an interstate highway or other highspeed, controlled access roadway can present some special dangers.

The National Safety Council has these tips for coping with tire trouble when on an interstate highway:

At the first sign of wheel or tire trouble, work your vehicles toward the breaksown lane or, if at all possible, toward an exit. Signal your intentions to drivers behind.

DON'T SLAM ON THE BRAKES!!! Let the car slow down gradually by taking your foot off the gas pedal. Don't worry about damaging the tire further. The tire likely is ruined anyway.

Once off the road, put out flares, warning flags or reflectorized triangles behind your vehicle to alert other drivers. keep your emergency flashers working. If you know how to change a tire and have the equipment, and can do it safely without being near traffic, change the wheel as you normally would.

The most important things about dealing with a flat tire on an interstate are: 1) don't stop in traffic, 2) get your vehicle completely away from the roadway before attempting to change a tire and 3) tackle changing a wheel only if you can do so without placing yourself in danger.
