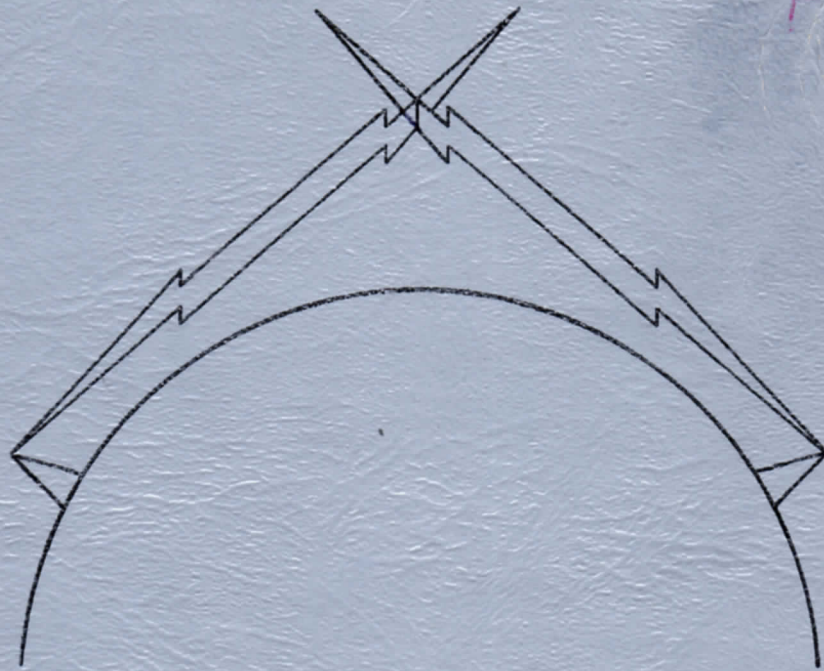


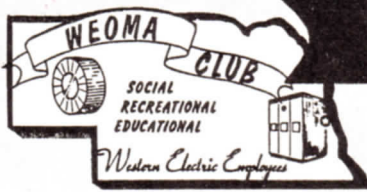


PRESIDENT'S REPORT

While the primary purpose of the Music Club was to have fun musically and "promote sociability among the vocalists and instrumentalists at the Omaha Works", the group performed publicly on four occasions, thereby contributing to the happiness of others and enhancing the reputation of Western Electric as a "good place to work".

In response to a request from the Picnic Committee, the band gave an hour-long concert at Peony Park for the entertainment of some 250 picnickers attending this annual affair.

On Sunday, December 12, 1965, 40 members of the Chorus visited six Omaha institutions to bring familiar Christmas carols to an estimated 500 shut-ins. Several members of the Band accompanied this group to provide instrumental variety. On Thursday and Friday, December 16 and 17, 1965, the entire Music Club entertained employees with Christmas music in the Company cafeterias.

A photo of the Omaha Works Chorus is featured in the 1966 Western Electric calendar for the month of December.

On February 19, 1966, approximately 25 Music Club members, families and friends, met at the Ranch Bowl for an evening of fun and relaxation.

For their final formal performance of the season, the Chorus and Band presented their annual "Spring Musicale". Two other local groups were invited to participate in this affair: the "WE Notes", a barbershop quartette, and the "CIRCLE M" Square Dance group from Millard. The Toastmasters provided a narrative for the two-hour program. Approximately 500 employees and guests attended this affair. The theme of this year's program depicted in word and song, the history of Nebraska for the past one hundred years, in anticipation of Centennial celebrations to be carried on in 1967.

Approximately two-thirds of our membership are participants in Chorus activities. Members met to rehearse on their own time, for a surprising total of 2800 hours. The Science Club had an active year in 1965, with an increase in membership and activities. Last summer the Club displayed a variety of exhibits for the Hobby Show, which included a ten-inch telescope mirror prepared by Messrs. R. Michaelsen, Dept. 241, E. Karohl, Dept. 723, and other members.

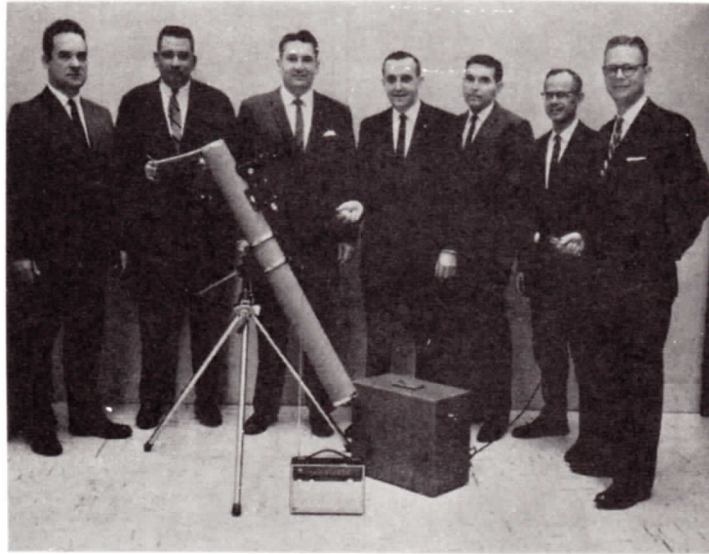
More than 50 science and travel movies were shown to members and guests during the year, with an average of 70 in attendance at the noon hour showing.

In addition, the astronomy section cooperated with the Yale Observatory professional astronomers in a program to more accurately determine the orbit of the moon and the height of certain Lunar mountains. Three sites on two occasions were set up to observe a star called 70B Piscium as it grazed, or appeared to touch the edge of the moon. When the moon passed the star, the light from the star winked on and off several times as it was interrupted by mountains on the edge of the moon. The interruptions were observed and timed by the use of Club equipment. The equipment includes telescopes, tape recorders, stop watches and short-wave radio receivers tuned to time signals from the National Bureau of Standards.

## SOFTBALL

Participation in softball activity showed a substantial increase during 1965. A total of 155 players were under contract as compared to 110 last year. Organization of a slow pitch league, in addition to the fast pitch league, was primarily responsible for this increase.

Seven teams made up of 95 players formed the fast pitch league. The Twins, managed by W. Wofford, Dept. 441, won the championship for the second consecutive year, and completed the season undefeated. The Engineers, managed by T. Bolton, Dept. 752, won the slow pitch championship. The slow pitch league consisted of five teams and 60 players from Western Electric, and three teams composed of approximately 45 players from the Bell Boosters. Surprisingly enough, fewer than ten players participated in both leagues.

It is expected that the slow pitch league will result in even greater participation next year, with several new teams entering the league.

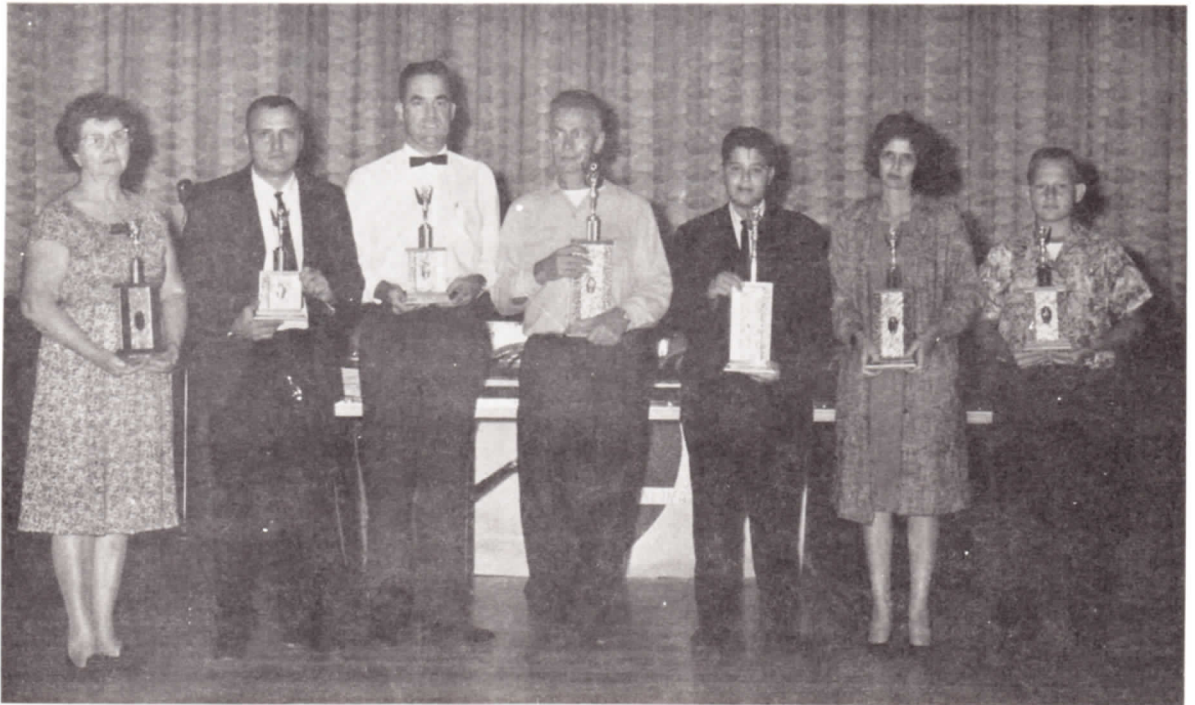

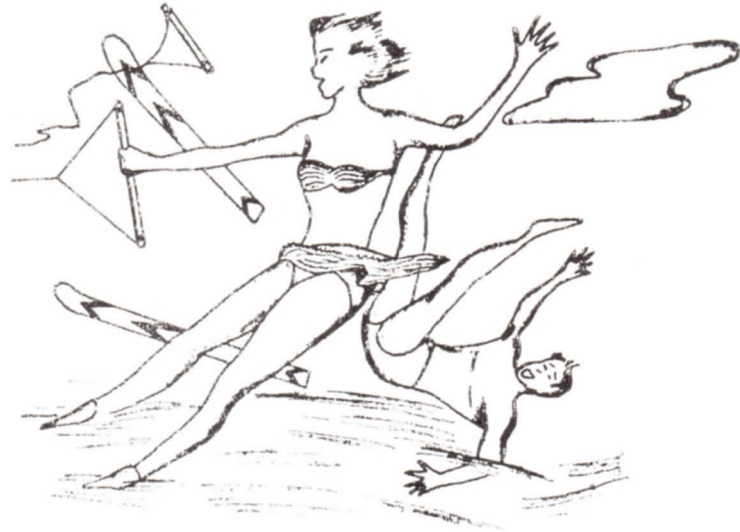
The Weoma Publicity Committee has continued to be successful through 1965-1966 with our monthly Weoma Newsletter. The Want Ad section has increased considerably this past year.

BLOOD DONOR PROGRAM

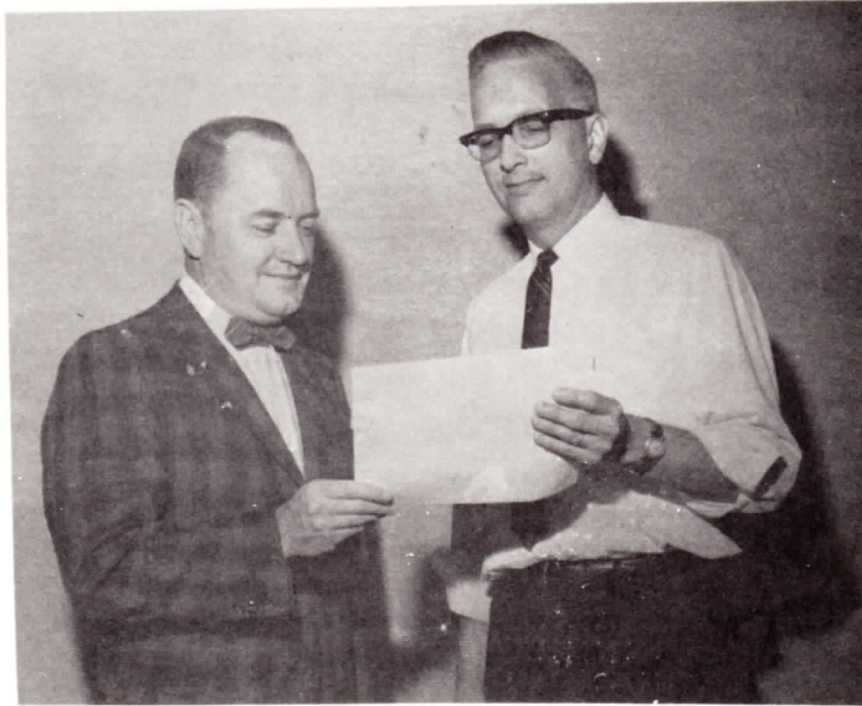
The Red Cross Bloodmobile visited the Omaha Works three times during the year 1965 - 1966, with contributions as follows:
