Sportsmen's Club— Members Informed on the Making of Fur Apparel

The March meeting of the Weoma Sportsmen's Club was highlighted by an interesting presentation by Omahan Doug Sorenson, who showed how furs are made into finished items such as coats, slippers, ear muffs, teddy bears and other types of apparel.

Sorenson allowed the members to look and feel the furs after they are tanned. Furs included in the display were badger, beaver, coyote, red and arctic fox and raccoon. He then described how the furs are cut into patterns for the different items he is making. He further stated that many big fur apparel makers cut the fur into strips and sew them together on the back side to make coats. He fielded many questions from the members as he was making his presentation.

Judging for the largest white tail deer racks and longest pheasant tail feathers was also held.

Using the Boone & Crockett method, three deer rack entries were judged with one prize being paid. Dan Dankof, retired, took first place with a score of 131. Other entries were Dan Dankof (121 3/8) and Ken Loth (115 3/8).

There were six entries in the longest pheasant tail competition with two prizes being awarded. First place went to Jerry Purnell, Dept. 581 (23 9/16") and Ken Loth (associate, son of Pete Loth, Dept. 1113) took second place (22 7/8").

The next Sportsmen's Club meeting will feature Chuck Syslo who will provide a presentation on knives, explaining the different stages of production and types of steel used. This presentation should make all of us appreciate how involved knife-making is.

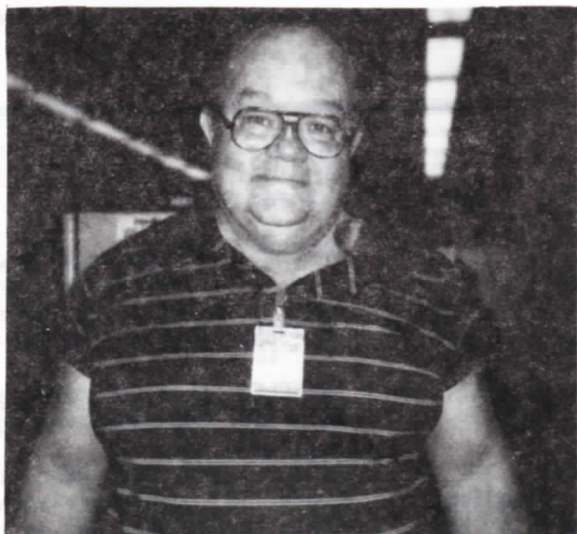

Pioneer Easter Food Drive Helps Fill Area Pantries

Dennis Karloff reported that the Omaha Works employees donated \$1,931.15 in cash to the 1991 Pioneer Easter Food Drive.

Karloff, who chairs the twice a year event, said the local Cornhusker Chapter added \$568.85 to bring the total to an even \$2,500.00. This amount was used to purchase 2,832 lbs. of meat from United AG for delivery to the Omaha Area Food Bank.

Food brought in to the plant containers amounted to 227 lbs. and the retirees donated approximately 100 lbs. of canned goods along with \$75.00 in cash donations.

Karloff said the drive could not have succeeded without the fine help of the committee and, of course, the generosity of the Works' employees.
