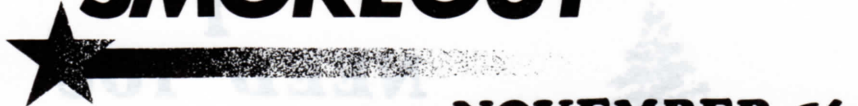

QUITTERS QUOTES-

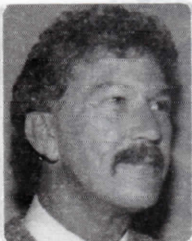


SUSAN ADDISON - quit September, 1988.

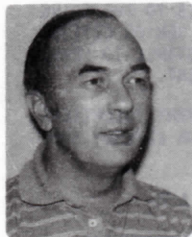


ART CLAUSEN - quit September 17, 1988.
