Book Sale Today, Tomorrow

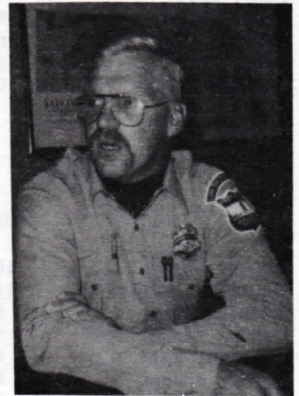
