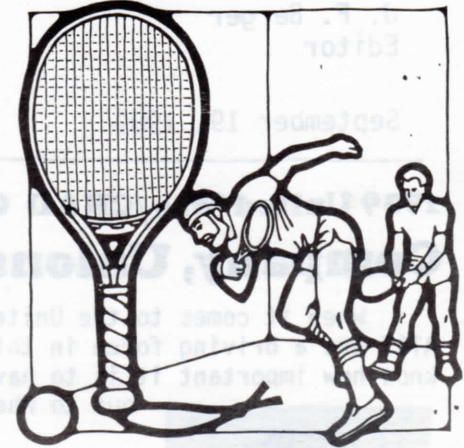

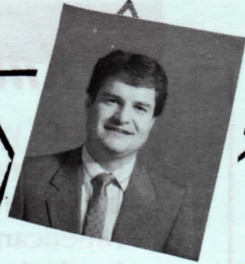

Know Your Number

What's your number? No, not your telephone number—your blood cholesterol number. About half of all American adults have blood cholesterol levels that are too high. Most don't even know their number. Next time you visit your doctor, have yours checked. If it's below 200 mg/dL, that's good. Get it checked again in 5 years. Your blood cholesterol is too high if:

- your number is 240 mg/dL or more; or
- your number is between 200 and 239 mg/dL *AND* you already have heart disease or two or more of the following apply to you: male sex, family history of heart attack before age 55, cigarette smoking, high blood pressure, diabetes, very overweight, and history of circulation problems (e.g., blockage of blood vessels going to the head or to the legs).

If your cholesterol level is too high, your doctor will do another blood test to determine the amount of good (high density lipoprotein [HDL]) cholesterol and bad (low density lipoprotein [LDL]) cholesterol.

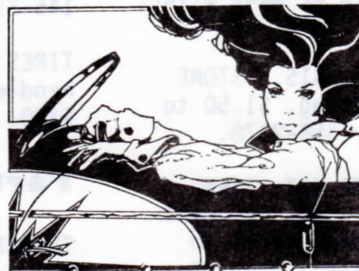
11th Annual Longs Peak Climb Successful

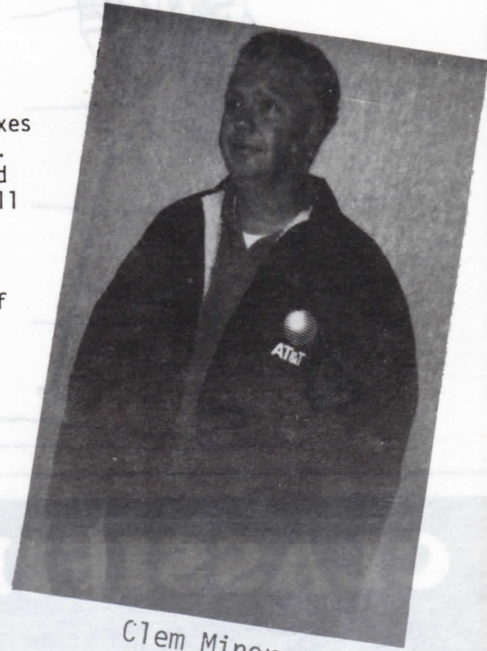

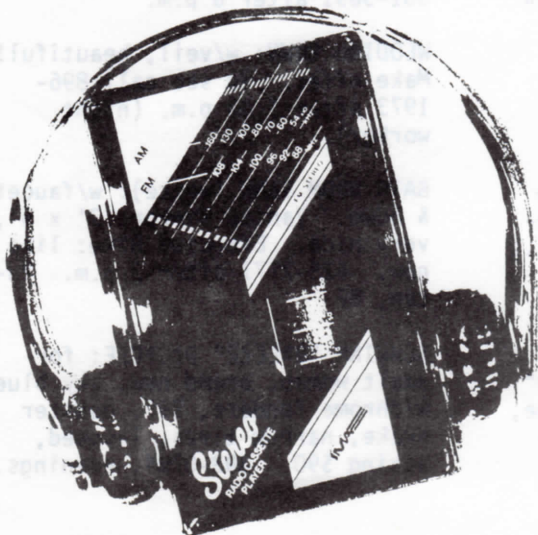
