Environmental Seedling Project

A nation-wide Pioneer project to help save the environment is underway. To make this effort successful, the Cornhusker Chapter is asking Pioneers and their Partners to volunteer time planting seedlings at two area locations. The following paragraphs explain the need.

BACKGROUND & NEED

Deforestation is being conducted at an alarming rate in many parts of the world. One area that has received considerable publicity is in the rain forests of South America where vast areas are being stripped of jungle vegetation for development or farming. If used for agriculture, the effect is less, but it still substantially reduces the amount of oxygen generated when compared to a rain forest.

The impact of this deforestation is an increase in atmospheric carbon dioxide which is expected to contribute to global warming and major climatic changes. Carbon dioxide is one of the so-called "greenhouse gasses" which are known to retard the loss of heat from the earth. Without this effect, the earth would be too cold to support life as we know it. Unfortunately, with the start of the industrial revolution, the level of carbon dioxide has been increasing in our atmosphere due to the burning of massive quantities of coal, oil, natural gas and wood. Global warming is occurring and most scientists agree that significant warming of the earth will occur and that there is great potential for producing devastating changes in climate around the world.

Living trees absorb carbon dioxide and release oxygen as a part of their growth process, thereby retarding global warming. Trees also tend to mitigate weather extremes by reducing the blast of winter winds and moderating summer temperature extremes. A stand of trees provides foraging and nesting sites for a variety of birds and animals, encouraging greater diversity of wildlife. When trees are planted on previously landscaped lands, there is a reduction in maintenance costs by eliminating the need to mow lawns or apply fertilizers, pesticides

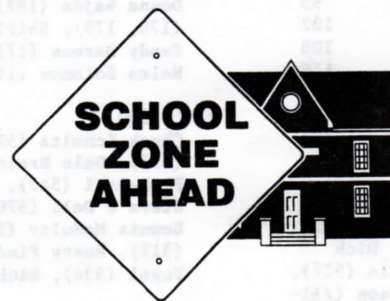

College Costs: Help From An Old Friend

January 1, 1990, was an important date for parents with college-bound children. Thanks to legislation passed by the last Congress, interest earnings on all U.S. Savings Bonds purchased from that date and used toward the tuition and fees of institutions of higher learning can be tax free. With college costs rising at an annual rate of six percent, this added feature for an old friend is a welcome addition.

To be eligible for the new benefit, Bonds must be purchased by parents in their own names(s), rather than in the names of their children. Buyers must be at least 24 years old, and certain income limitations must be met in the year the Bonds are redeemed to meet college expenses.

SAFETY TRIVIA

Trivia about the dangers of secondary cigarette smoke:

1. Who are more vulnerable to the effects of smoke produced by other family members--children or adults?
2. How many chemicals have been identified in tobacco smoke? (a) 1,500 (b) 2,500 or (c) 4,000
3. What are some toxic substances found in cigarette smoke?
4. What is the difference between sidestream smoke and mainstream smoke?
5. Does mainstream or sidestream smoke pose a greater threat to the non-smoker?

ANSWERS:

1. Infants and young children are especially vulnerable. They breathe more rapidly than adults, inhale more air--and more tobacco smoke--in comparison with their total body weight.
2. (c) 4,000 chemicals and at least 43 known carcinogens.
3. Tars, naphthalene, pyrene, benzopyrene, carbon monoxide, methane, ammonia, acetylene and hydrogen cyanide.
4. Sidestream smoke is the burning end of a cigarette and mainstream smoke of the exhalations of the smoker.
5. Sidestream smoke goes directly into the air unfiltered and therefore poses a greater threat to the nonsmokers.
