Pioneers Elect Jim Kelly Chapter Vice President

The votes have been counted and the Pioneers, active and retired, have elected Jim Kelly, Dept. 083, as the new junior vice president of the Cornhusker Chapter at the Omaha Works.

Kelly defeated Joyce Ossler, Dept. 582, in a spirited contest as both campaigned for the one-year post which automatically enables the winner to advance to senior vice president and eventually to the presidency of the Chapter.

A total of 850 votes were tabulated, according to Bob Miller, Pioneer administrator. He said this was 200 more than voted in the 1989 election.

"I want to thank those who supported my candidacy and I will be soliciting everyone's support for Pioneer activities in the years ahead," said Kelly.

In other election results, Tom Baye, retired, won the two-year term as Life Member Representative by defeating Pat Nowak, also retired from AT&T.

Leo Thietje, Dept. 583, moves up to senior vice president for one year and Rich Schaben, Dept. 532, becomes the president effective July 1. His term is also for one year.

Bowen, who has addressed the Sportsmen's Club at previous visits, should provide an interesting, informative and action packed meeting.

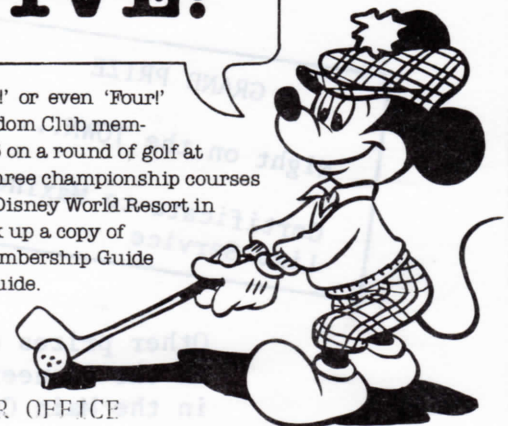

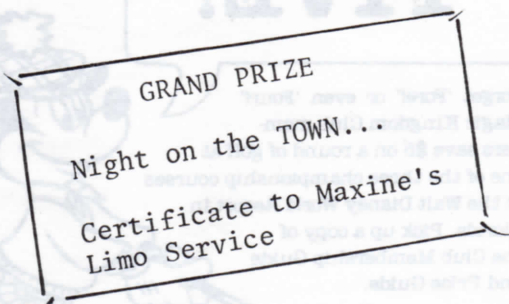

Measure Your Pressure

The Right Moves

HealthCheck

High blood pressure is a condition in which a person's blood pressure goes up too high and stays there. Blood pressure normally goes up and down with daily activities. Blood pressure that stays high all the time is a problem.

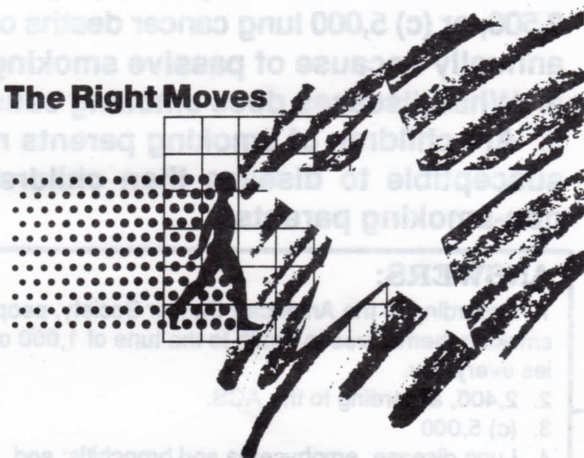
High blood pressure is especially dangerous because it has no clear signs or symptoms. A person can have it and not even know it. It doesn't make you feel dizzy or nervous. But it can cause heart disease, kidney disease, and stroke. And the higher the blood pressure, the higher the risk. That's why you should get your blood pressure checked regularly. If it's high, get it treated and keep it under control.

Pressure Check

Before you can do anything about it, you must know what your blood pressure is. The blood pressure reading is made up of two numbers. The higher number is your systolic pressure. The lower is your diastolic pressure. Either one, or both, can be high and may require treatment. Measurements consistently 140/90 mm Hg or higher suggest high blood pressure.

Follow your doctor's advice to bring your blood pressure down and keep it there. While there's no cure for high blood pressure, it can be treated through changes in diet and/or drugs. Ask your doctor to work out a plan that you can live with.

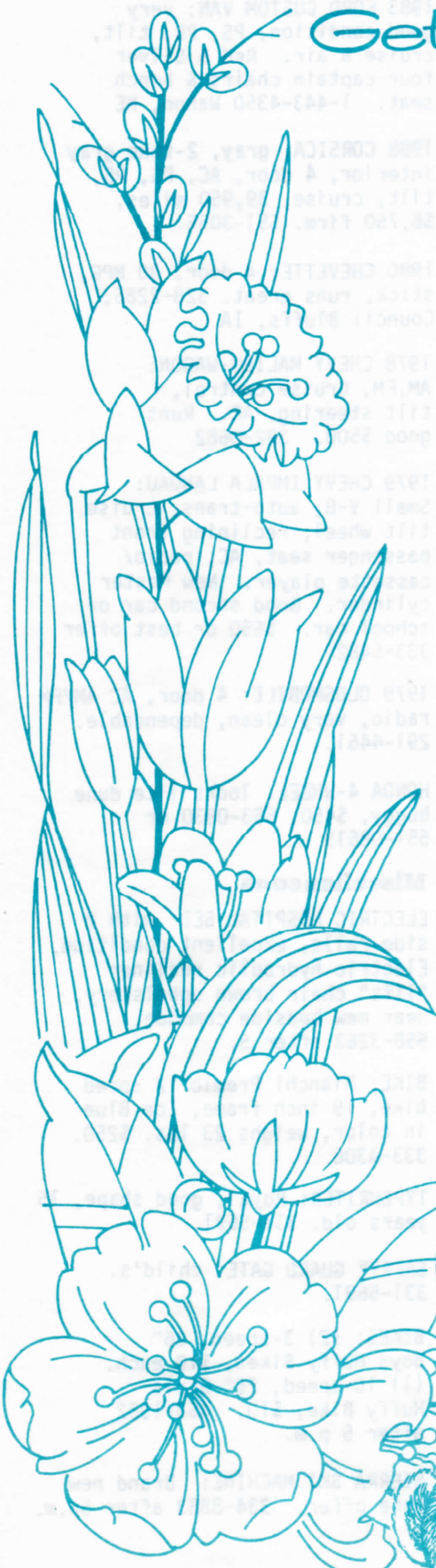
