All fishing contest entries for the 1989-90

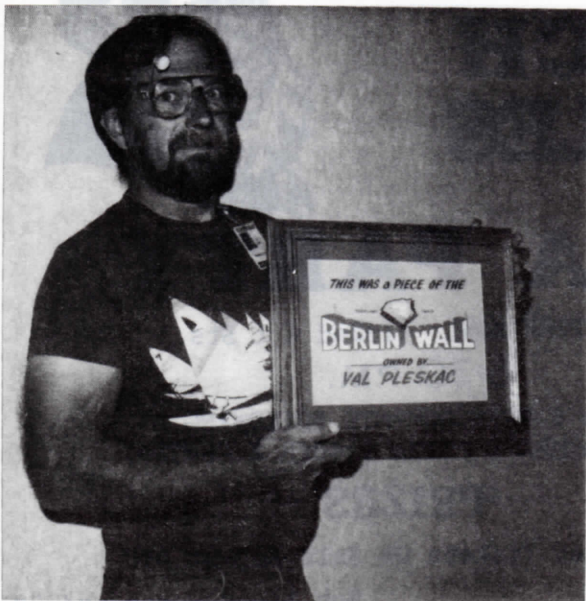
fishing contest should be turned in or brought to the August meeting. Winners will be announced at that time. New club memberships are available from officers or at the meeting.

Shortly after World War II ended, Sir Winston Churchill, Prime Minister of Great Britain, uttered these immortal words: "An iron curtain has descended over Europe".

The "iron curtain" was Churchill's description of communism's way of separating Europe between east and west. Not long after his words were spoken, the Berlin Wall was erected to make certain the peoples of eastern Europe would not or could not emigrate west.

As recent history has shown, the overwhelming desire for freedom of the people of East Germany, Poland and other communist dominated countries has finally brought the "wall" down.

A piece of the Berlin Wall is now on display in the Weoma Club showcase in the main cafeteria. A friend of Val Pleskac, IBU 582, gave him a small piece of the wall taken from the east (communist) side.

Pleskac had it framed and is sharing it with his co-workers, many of whom have relatives and/or friends living in what was the Communist Bloc countries.

The "piece of the Berlin Wall" will be on display indefinitely.
