Bill Peters, club president, has lined up Jim Newman, master taxidermist, to speak at the December 5 meeting. Newman's subject will be, of course, taxidermy. He will display steps needed to be followed for a good stuffed and mounted animal skin.

A Joyous Season

HAVE YOU EVER HEARD THE LOVELY LEGEND OF THE GLASTONBURY THORN - THE TREE THAT BLOOMS TO CELEBRATE CHRISTMAS?

The legend goes back to the middle ages when people in Europe told their children stories of trees that were believed to break into blossom, or bend their branches downward in reverence on Holy Night.

In England the Holy Thorn is said to bloom on Christmas Eve. The legend tells of the arrival of St. Joseph of Arimathea in England shortly after the death of Christ. He journeyed to preach at an abbey in the town of Glastonbury. There he thrust his thornwood staff into the ground. It took root and grew, and every year it blossomed at midnight on Christmas Eve.

The legend was extended to the United States early in this century when a cutting from the Glastonbury Thorn was given to the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C. This cutting grew into a large tree in the Cathedral garden. The tree blooms occasionally during the Christmas season.

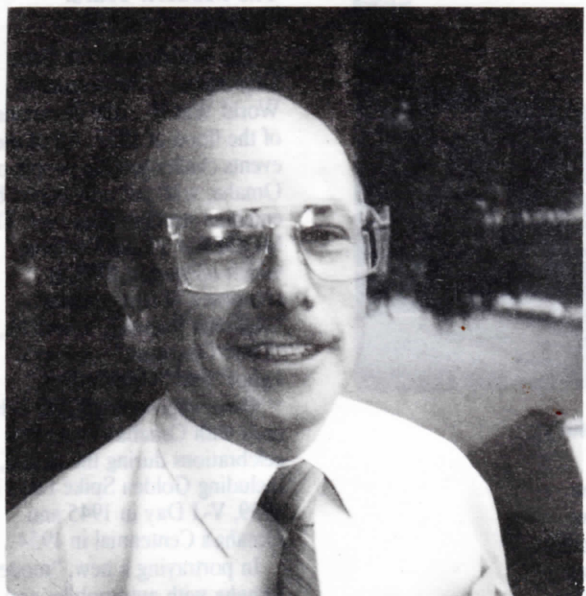
The Christmas stories and legends that have come to us from the middle ages add a magical quality to our remembrance of the birth of the Christ Child.

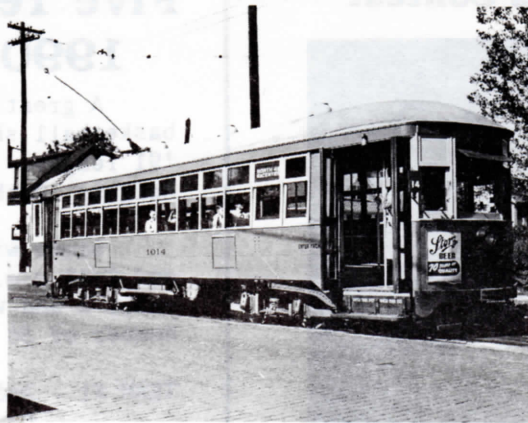

Coming of Age: Omaha 1880-1898

Omaha came of age in the restless decades of the 1880's and 1890's, when this small hamlet at the edge of the Great Plains was transformed from a rowdy frontier town into an industrialized city.

This colorful and dramatic era of Omaha's history is captured in Western Heritage Museum's first permanent exhibit, which opened in 1983.

The exhibit documents Omaha's roots in railroading, agriculture and the cattle industry and presents the "who" of Omaha's coming of age — the immigrants who came here to build a better life for themselves. Galleries in the exhibit chronicle Omahans "Making a Living," "Family Life," "City Services" and "Entertainment." The exhibit includes an authentic 1890's schoolroom as well as artifacts from the Trans-Mississippi Exposition of 1898 — a triumph of optimism and imagination for the City of Omaha.

Into the Twentieth Century: Omaha 1900-1930

Omaha moved into a new century with pride in its new identity as a major urban center. Dramatic events and changes were to come about in the first three decades of the Twentieth Century, and the record of their impact on the heritage of the community is recorded in this exhibit.

This six-gallery exhibit is the second of Western Heritage Museum's permanent exhibits. It was completed in 1985.

To visit this exhibit is to travel back in time as Omaha becomes a part of the Twentieth Century. The galleries depict "The People," "Lifestyles," "Bosses and Reformers," "Technology," "Events of the Day" and the "City Beautiful."

The changing lifestyles of the people are dramatically reflected in this exhibit. Omaha, that rough settlement on the banks of the Missouri River, entered the Twentieth Century with grandeur.

The Modern Years: Omaha 1930-1954

The hardships of the Great Depression... the horrors of World War II... the devastation of the flood of 1952. All of these events challenged the people of Omaha, who not only coped but emerged stronger than ever. THE MODERN YEARS exhibit, which opened in 1988, is composed of five galleries: "National Events," "Lifestyles," "Civic Concerns," "A Day's Labor" and "Celebrations."

Quite appropriately, the exhibit ends with Omaha's exuberant celebrations during the period, including Golden Spike Days in 1939, V-J Day in 1945 and Omaha's Centennial in 1954.

In portraying a new, "modern" Omaha with automobiles and drive-ins, television and TV dinners, this exhibit reflects not only Omaha's growth and prosperity, but a new sense of community spirit. Omaha has become one of this country's great cities.
