Simmons Describes 'Jungle' Features at Kick-Off of 1990 Zoo Membership Drive

Dr. Lee Simmons, director of the Henry Doorly Zoo, was the special guest at the Omaha Works in-house kick-off for the annual zoo membership drive on February 21.

Simmons was introduced by the Omaha Works zoo membership drive chairman, Dick McGaughey, and immediately began an in-depth description of the Lied Jungle now under construction.

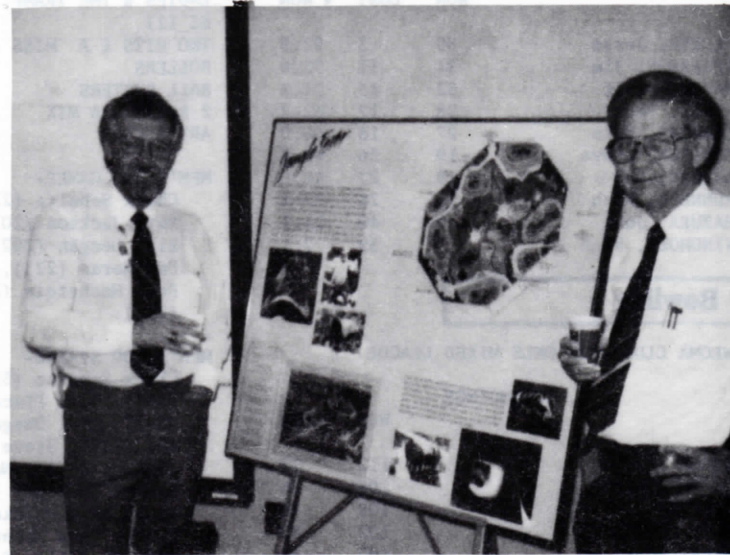
The 60,000 square foot building is a re-creation of tropical rain forests with humidity being kept between 80-85 percent, according to Simmons.

He told the enthusiastic group of membership sellers that the "Jungle" will feature habitats from Asia, Africa, South America and Australia under a near transparent roof. A floor plan of the "Jungle" showed the areas where many different animals will be located. Leopards and jungle cats will be in one area and larger primates will be in another with islands and moats. A suspension bridge will be built 35 feet above water, next to a waterfall.

"Monkeys from Africa, lemurs from Madagascar and also pygmy chimpanzee's will have a home in the jungle", Simmons said. Other animals to inhabit the area will be green tree pythons, spider monkeys, crocodiles, fish of various species. Visitors will be able to go under water to see pygmy hippos.

Giant water lilies 6 to 7 feet in diameter from the Amazon in addition to ferns, ginger plants, water hyacinths, banana and bamboo trees will be planted. Thirty giant timber bamboo trees, 35 feet tall, have recently been delivered to the zoo. When the Lied Jungle opens for visitors in 1992, these trees will be nearing 70 feet in height, according to the Zoo Director.

Describing the construction of the "Jungle", Simmons said it is the largest concrete poured structure ever built by Kiewit Construction Company. Two man-made trees will stand 50 feet tall with twelve others four feet in diameter. These "trees" will cover support beams and contain air shafts. A waterfall, 50 feet high, along with eleven smaller ones, will drop 1,000 gallons of water per minute. Tropical plants will be watered

with 6,000 gallons of warm, distilled water each day.

"The Lied Jungle is the biggest project ever tackled at the Doorly Zoo, the most challenging and yet, the most fun", said Simmons.

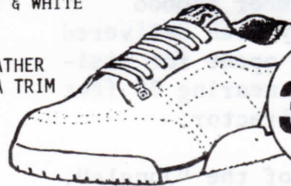

As February, National Heart Month, comes to an end, here is one more reminder to take care of your heart.

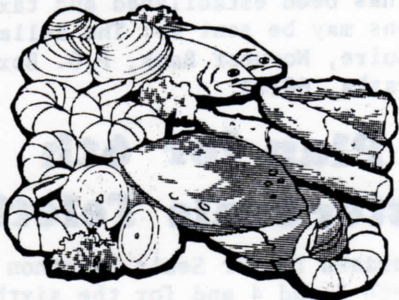

- * A sudden, temporary weakness or numbness of the face, arm or leg.
- * Temporary difficulty or loss of speech or trouble understanding speech.
- * Sudden, temporary dimness or loss of vision particularly in one eye.
- * An episode of double vision.
- * Unexplained headaches or a change in the pattern of your headaches.
- * Temporary dizziness or unsteadiness.
- * A recent change in personality or mental ability.

If you notice one or more of these symptoms seek the advice of your doctor. Strokes can occur at any age, in men and women, at any stage of life. In dealing with any illness the sooner you seek medical attention the better the possible outcome.
