## **Holz Family Records Over** 120 Years With W.E., AT&T

Back in the mid-1950s Jerry and Paul Holz were employed by Peter Kiewit Construction Company and were involved in the building of a new manufacturing facility on what was farmland at 120th & I Streets. What they were helping construct was the Western Electric plant, a place where three of their brothers and a sister would be employed for a total of over 120 years.

Karl Holz and Mary Ann Cornell began their employment in October and November, 1956 respectively, at the company's A Building pilot plant located at 16th & Cuming Streets and were soon after transferred to the present location. Karl, a former guard, retired in February, 1983 while Mary Ann is still employed in Department 081-2.

After high school graduation in June, 1959, Bob Holz began working at Western Electric and is employed in Department 551-4. Fred Holz followed the lead of his brothers and sister and on December 2, 1959 began his W.E. employment.

At Fred's recent retirement party (January 12) the three Holz brothers and sister reminisced about their years at W.E. and AT&T and how the building that brothers Jerry and Paul helped construct changed their lives for the better.



# FBLOODMOBILE

#### A DONOR'S THOUGHTS

I'm lying on a cot, staring at the ceiling while blood drips out of my arm. I'm trying to figure out why I enjoy doing this.

When I look at it objectively, giving blood to the Red Cross ought to offer little pleasure. How many people enjoy being stabbed in a sensitive fingertip to get a drop of blood for testing? Or having a big needle stuck into a vein? Or watching their blood run into a plastic bag? Yet I have always found that after giving blood, my day is a little brighter. Giving blood makes me feel good. I suspect it has something to do with my ideals. It's a way to share my abundance with someone else.

In one sense it's the ultimate gift. My blood, after all, is far more valuable to me than any gifts of time or money I can make.

My pint of blood comes close to the traditional "tithe." It's a fraction less than one-tenth of all the blood I have. But unlike money, I don't get much back from it, except a glass of juice and a cup of coffee. No receipts. No income-tax refunds.

I know I'm giving it to someone who really needs my help. A beggar may use a phony sob-story to cheat me out of money. But the person on the operating table, the victim of a traffic accident, the leukemia patient is in no position to cheat anyone - except death.

I know too that my gift goes only to the person who needs it. Unlike money, none of it can be siphoned off by any intermediary for administrative or publicity expenses.

And it's completely anonymous. I don't even have to cope with embarrassing "thank-you's" - or the even more embarrassing lack of them.
