I want to quit, I want to quit, I want to quit! And millions do quit every year. That's right! Millions of Americans quit smoking each year. If you are a smoker, have you ever considered quitting? With the '90's well on their way, many smokers have stopped by the TLC office asking for advice on how to go about quitting. Here are a few tips.

The beginning of a new year is a good time to consider quitting. If it has been on your mind for some time, it may be the right time for you.

THE CASE FOR QUITTING-

Quitting is an individual decision. Smokers don't need to be told that smoking is bad for them. Most smokers are well aware of that. What they need is support for the confidence that they can quit. Individuals considering quitting require a lot of positive self talk. They need to convince themselves that they can be successful at quitting.

The preparation for quitting, the period of getting ready to quit may actually be the most important part of smoking cessation. This is the time that one develops their strategy. Keep in mind that quitting is a long term process. Try not to hurry it. Don't try to quit before you are ready. Also, try to reduce the stress level in your life before you begin.

Smokers often see quitting as an insurmountable task. It is more realistic to think of quitting as a gradual, step-by-step process. Plan your course, anticipate obstacles, then implement your plan. After you quit, be prepared for possible set backs and don't fall victim to them. If you would like additional information on how to quit smoking, stop by the TLC office.

I'm lying on a cot, staring at the ceiling while blood drips out of my arm. I'm trying to figure out why I enjoy doing this.

When I look at it objectively, giving blood to the Red Cross ought to offer little pleasure. How many people enjoy being stabbed in a sensitive fingertip to get a drop of blood for testing? Or having a big needle stuck into a vein? Or watching their blood run into a plastic bag? Yet I have always found that after giving blood, my day is a little brighter. Giving blood makes me feel good. I suspect it has something to do with my ideals. It's a way to share my abundance with someone else.

In one sense it's the ultimate gift. My blood, after all, is far more valuable to me than any gifts of time or money I can make.

My pint of blood comes close to the traditional "tithe." It's a fraction less than one-tenth of all the blood I have. But unlike money, I don't get much back from it, except a glass of juice and a cup of coffee. No receipts. No income-tax refunds.

I know I'm giving it to someone who really needs my help. A beggar may use a phony sob-story to cheat me out of money. But the person on the operating table, the victim of a traffic accident, the leukemia patient is in no position to cheat anyone - except death.

I know too that my gift goes only to the person who needs it. Unlike money, none of it can be siphoned off by any intermediary for administrative or publicity expenses.

And it's completely anonymous. I don't even have to cope with embarrassing "thank-you's" - or the even more embarrassing lack of them.


