1. At what age should a person have their cholesterol level measured at least once every five years?
2. At what levels do most heart attacks actually occur in people?
3. What is cholesterol?
4. What function does your liver have with cholesterol?
5. What kind of cholesterol should concern you?

ANSWERS-

1) All adults 20 and over. 2) Cholesterol levels between 200 and 240. 3) A soft, fat-like substance found among the fats in the bloodstream. 4) Your liver produces about 1,000 milligrams of cholesterol a day and it is needed to produce certain hormones and construct cells. It also filters our cholesterol and helps eliminate it from the body. 5) Dietary cholesterol, found in foods from animals, such as eggs, yolks, meat, fish, poultry and whole milk dairy products.
