"The Need Never Ends for Hug-a-Bears"—Fitzgerald

One-Hundred Needed Each Month by Local Agencies

A plea for volunteers has gone out to all employees from the Cornhusker Chapter of the Telephone Pioneers. Help is needed for Hug-A-Bear, an ongoing project that aids children in traumatic situations.

The Omaha Metro District of the Department of Social Services is asking for approximately fifty hug-a-bears each month for their foster care program. An additional 50 hug-a-bears are needed by the Tri-Mutual Aid Society for their rescue units. Douglas, Sarpy, Washington, Saunders and Cass counties are served the Tri-Mutual Aid Society.

"This is an ongoing project and the need for hug-a-bears is constant", said Vicki Fitzgerald, chairwoman for the Pioneer volunteer effort. "We must rely on the employees and retirees to keep the supply of 'bears' available, month after month, in order to fulfill the needs of the organizations that use them", she added.

Patterns for making the hug-a-bears are available at the Pioneer office and take a minimum amount of time to make. The Pioneers would like those interested in helping to consider making a certain amount each month so that a constant supply is at hand.

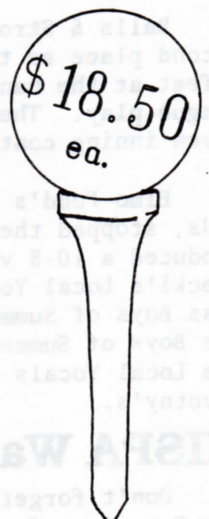

Dare To Be Safe!

Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death among people age 44 and younger. Moreover, they are the number-one cause of on-the-job fatalities and account for ten times more fatalities than those caused by all other forms of transportation.

The use of Safety Belts can make a difference in accident related fatalities and injuries:

- * About half the people who die in automobile accidents could be saved if they wore safety belts.
- * Three out of four crashes occur within 25 miles of home at speeds of less than 40 miles per hour.
- * A common cause of death and injury is caused by occupants being thrown into each other.

Safety belts can help occupants in 6 ways:

1. There is a ride-down benefit in which the belt begins to stop the wearer as the vehicle is stopping.
2. The belt keeps the head and face of the wearer from striking objects such as the wheel rim, windshield, interior post or dashboard.
3. The belt spreads the stopping force widely across the strong parts of the body.
4. Belts prevent vehicle occupants from colliding with each other.
5. Belts help the driver to maintain vehicle control, thus decreasing the possibility of an additional collision.
6. Belts keep occupants from being ejected out of the vehicle.

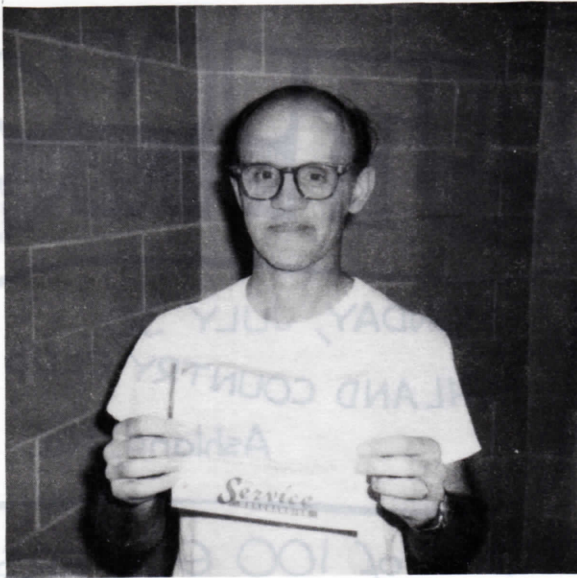
