### Hispa Sponsors Walkathon to Benefit Scholarship Fund

Mark the date of June 23, 1990, on your calendar, and be prepared to enjoy the great outdoors in one of Omaha's city parks while helping youths to further their education.

The Omaha Works chapter of the Hispanic Association of AT&T Employees (Hispa) is sponsoring a 10K (6.2 miles) walkathon that day, originating in South Omaha's Mandan Park. Proceeds from the walkathon will go to the National Hispanic Scholarship Fund (NHSF), a non-profit organization founded in 1975 to assist Hispanics in furthering their education and career goals.

The walkathon is being held in conjunction with other Hispa chapter walkathons that will be conducted throughout the nation on or about the same date, said Jean Belmudez, local walkathon chairperson. Those walkathon proceeds also will benefit NHSF.

Money for the scholarship fund will come out of entry fees and the sale of donated baked goods and refreshments during the walkathon, Belmudez said. Participants

Pioneers and Partners of Cornhusker Chapter 92 (AT&T Omaha Works) joined thousands of other Region 3 Pioneers to support the movement for a healthier planet.

On Saturday, April 21, fifty-two Pioneers, Partners and family members from the Cornhusker Chapter met at Wehrspann and Cunningham Lakes to plant 4,000 trees in honor of Earth Day.

With a nationwide goal of planting one tree for each of its 800,000 members, the Telephone Pioneers of America have taken the most ambitious effort of its kind in the country. The program is funded by a special, one-time contribution from AT&T's environmental safety organization.

The morning of the tree planting dawned with heavy fog that lingered on mid-way throughout the morning. "Planting the trees and shrubs was the easy part. Trying to see where we were going was more difficult," according to Project Chairman Rich Schaben, president of the chapter.

Schaben said the Pioneers planted sixteen varieties of trees and bushes that will eventually serve as windbreaks and habitat for wildlife. Among the trees planted were hackberry, red cedar, ponderosa pine, burr oak, cherry and green ash. The tree species and planting locations were recommended by the U.S. Corps of Engineers and the Natural Resources District (NRD).

As a national project, the Pioneer Association will purchase and plant seedlings in areas as diverse as the plains states where trees are used as windbreaks, or along the South Carolina coast to help replenish much needed sea-outs which were destroyed by Hurricane Hugo.

# Cut the Saturated Fat and Cholesterol

For most people, having a healthy heart means having a blood cholesterol level lower than 200 mg/dL. If your doctor says your blood cholesterol is too high, eat less fat, saturated fat and cholesterol.

Start by making small changes. Eat more chicken and turkey (without the skin), fish, and lean meat in place of fatty cuts of beef, pork, and lamb. Drink 1% or skim milk instead of whole or 2% milk. Cut back on cheese and cream sauces. And eat more fruits and vegetables, whole grain cereals and breads, and pasta.

Cut the fat, saturated fat, and cholesterol for a low blood cholesterol level and a healthy heart.

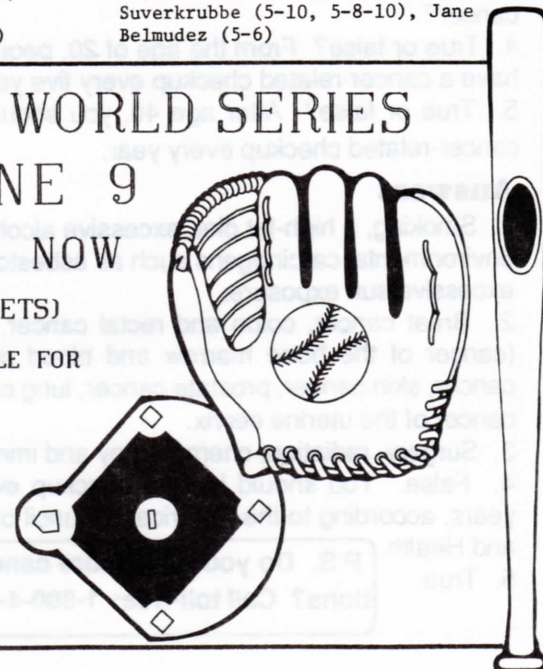

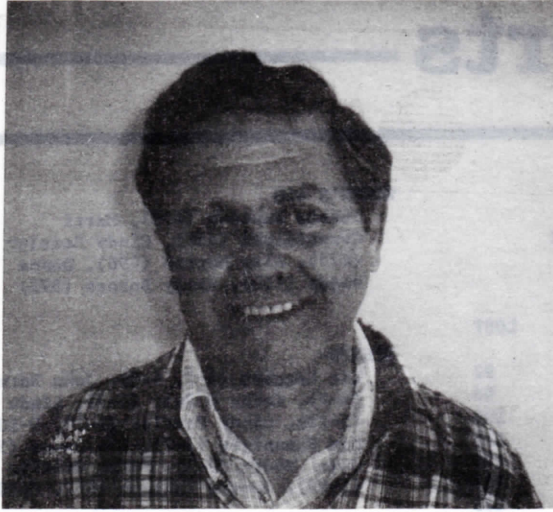

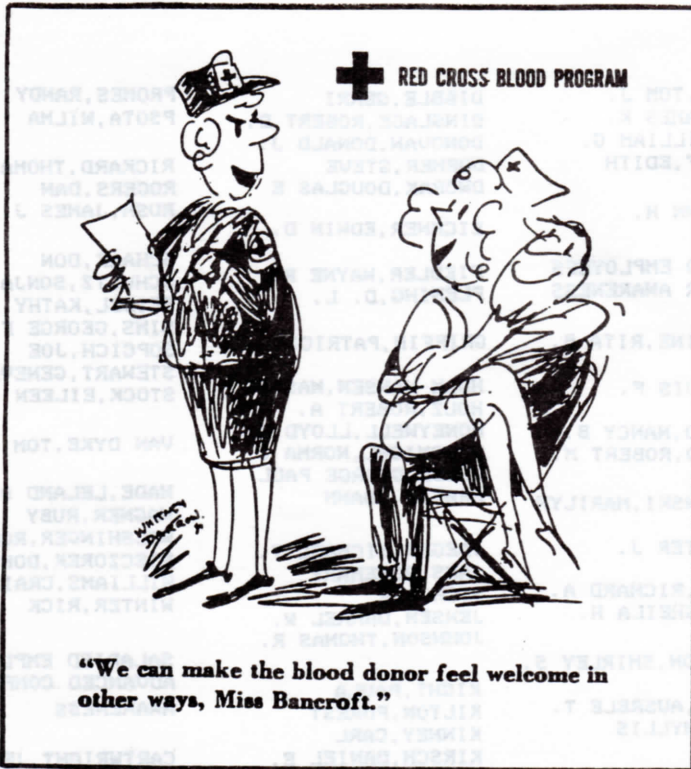
