No One is Immune to Stress;

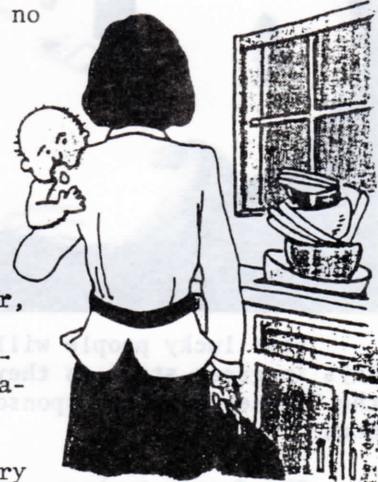
Don't Be Your Own Worst Enemy

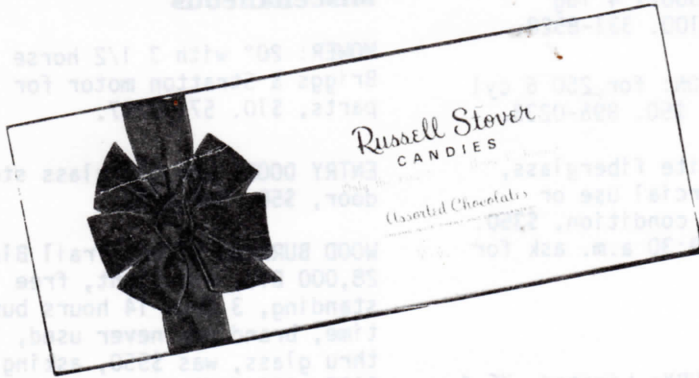

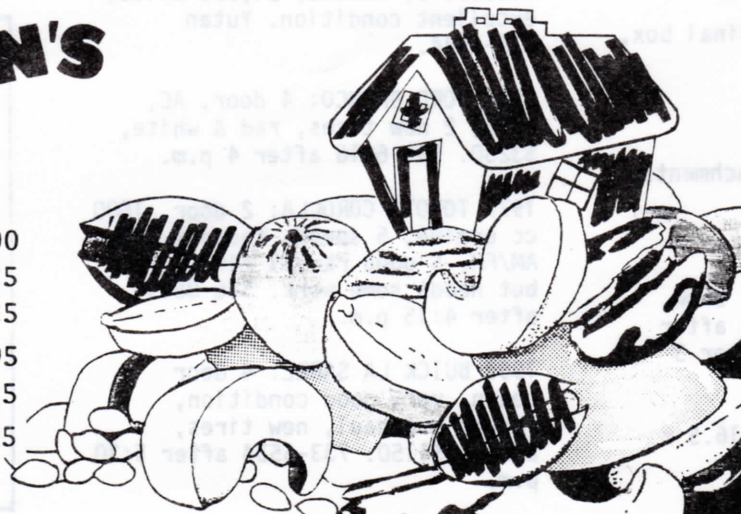
