Tylers Take Tie Breaker; Carstenses Go Undeclared

The 1990 Weoma Club Mixed Tennis "A" League season was extended after the teams of Tyler and DeBoer finished the regular schedule with identical 7-1 records.

A playoff was held between the two teams to determine the league champion. In the first set Judy and Jim Tyler defeated Dottie and John DeBoer by a score of 6-3. The DeBoers came back in the second set to win by the same score.

The entire season came down to the last set with the Tylers winning it, 6-1, to finish with an 8-1 record. DeBoers finished with 7 wins, 2 losses for a solid second place finish over the team of Julie Micklavzina and Rhett Zeplin who closed the season at 4-4.

In the "B" League, Judy and Roger Carstens never felt the agony of defeat while posting a perfect season record of 11-0. They overcame rugged competition time after time to take the league championship. Close behind in second place was the team of Bonnie and Gene Stuto, 9-2, followed by Mary and Tim Van Roy at 7-4.

The Pioneers could have picked a warmer day for their annual men's fall golf outing. At tee-time the wind chill index stood at 19° on the Tiburon course. The event was held on Sunday, October 7.

Taking top prize with a low gross score of 83 and low net of 69 was Charlie Gerhart who registered nine pars on the eighteen hole course. Gerhart's luck continued after play was over as he also won the door prize, that being a golf bag donated by the course.

Only four birdies were recorded among the forty-two players on the brisk autumn day. The four to do so were Hugh Wells, Max Obrecht, Bob Barnes and Lou Carnazzo.

Gene Utterback's low net score of 66 was good enough to edge out Dave Tso for first place in the second flight. Tso's 67 and Rich Schaben's 68 took second and third place, respectively.

In the third flight, Otis Knutson won handily with a 67 net followed by Tony David's 71 and Bob Roh with a 72. The high net score for the event was established by Rick Novak with a 92.

There were six flag prizes awarded. Four were for 'closest to the pin' and two for the longest drives (one for those over fifty years of age and one for the golfers under fifty. Closest to the pin winners were Paul Pickrel (#3 hole), Lou Carnazzo (#7 hole), Gene Utterback (#11 hole) and Jim Kelly (#16 hole).

The longest drive winners were Charlie Gerhart (#4 hole) and Ralph Burgett (#18 hole).
