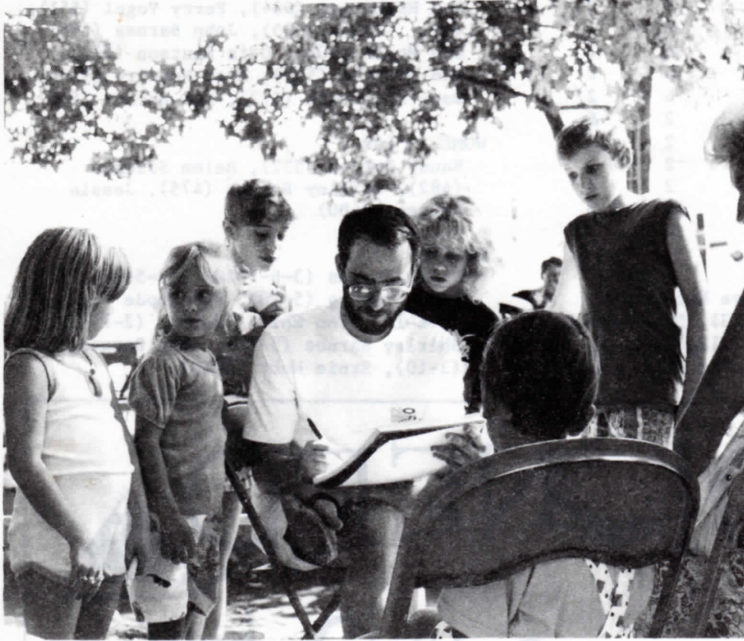



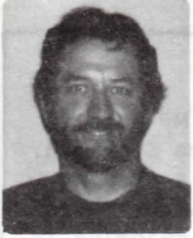

# September is National Cholesterol Educational Month

## Do You Know Your Cholesterol Level???

### HOW MUCH BLOOD CHOLESTEROL IS TOO MUCH?

Ask your doctor what your total cholesterol level is. If it is 200 mg/dL (milligrams of cholesterol per deciliter of blood) or higher, your doctor will recheck it to make sure that the number is right. Check the chart below to find out where your number falls:

<b>Desirable Blood Cholesterol</b>	Less than 200 mg/dL
<b>Borderline-High Blood Cholesterol</b>	200-239 mg/dL
<b>High Blood Cholesterol</b>	240 mg/dL and above

Note: These categories apply to anyone 20 years of age or older.



#### Desirable blood cholesterol.

If your blood cholesterol level is less than 200 mg/dL, it's in the desirable range. Have it checked again within 5 years.

#### Borderline-high blood cholesterol.

Do you have other risk factors for heart disease? Check the risk factors below that apply to you.

- high blood pressure (140/90 mm Hg or greater)
- cigarette smoker
- family history of heart disease before the age of 55
- diabetes
- vascular disease
- obesity (30 percent or more overweight)
- male

If you have not checked any of the boxes above and you don't have heart disease but your blood cholesterol level is between 200 mg/dL and 239 mg/dL, you may need to watch your diet. Your blood cholesterol should be remeasured in 1 year.

Having two or more risk factors along with borderline-high cholesterol increases your chances of getting heart disease even more than just having borderline-high cholesterol alone. If your blood cholesterol level is between 200 mg/dL and 239 mg/dL and you already have heart disease or if you have checked two or more of the risk boxes, your doctor will measure your LDL and HDL cholesterol levels.

#### High blood cholesterol.

If your total blood cholesterol is 240 mg/dL or greater, your doctor will measure your LDL-and HDL-cholesterol even if you don't have any other risk factors.

## What Are LDL— and HDL— Cholesterol?

Cholesterol is carried around in your blood in little "packages." Low density lipoproteins (LDL) are one of the packages that carry cholesterol through your blood to tissues in your body so the cholesterol can be used. The cholesterol in LDL's is what builds up on the artery walls, which is why LDL-cholesterol is often called "bad" cholesterol. High density lipoproteins (HDL's) are the packages that help remove cholesterol from the body, preventing the buildup of cholesterol on the artery walls; HDL's are often referred to as "good" cholesterol. Along with your total blood cholesterol level, your LDL-and HDL-cholesterol levels provide more information on your risk of getting heart disease.
