This Credit Union office is opening earlier on a trial basis and will re-analyze the traffic pattern between 8:00 and 8:30 a.m. in 90 days.

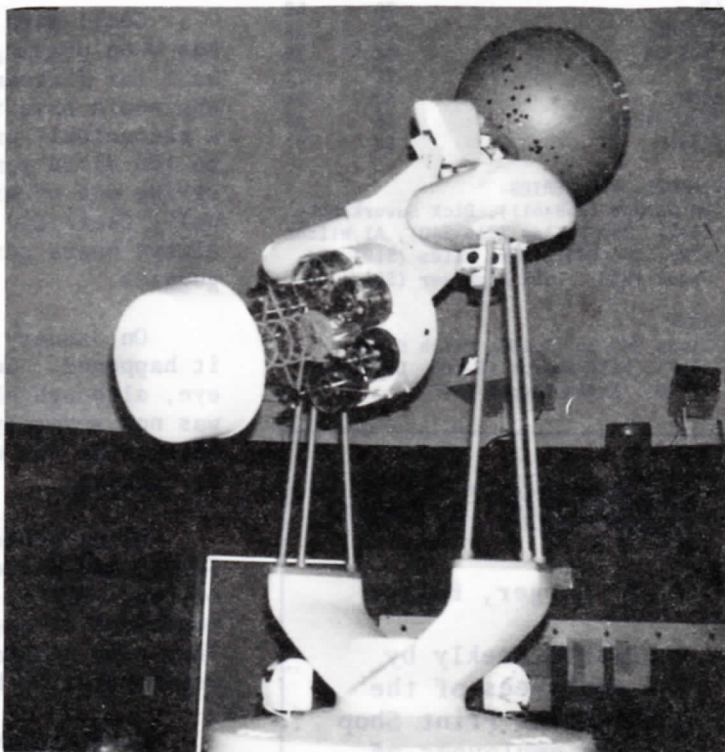
Toastmaster Installation Dinner

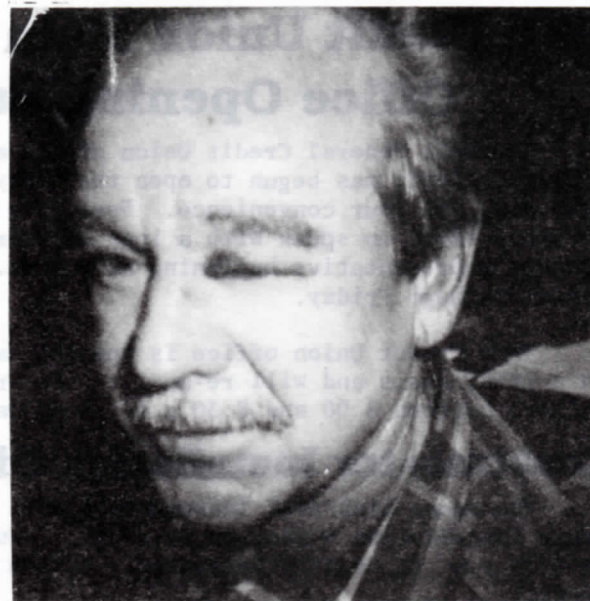
Sports Injuries Lessened Thanks to Safety Glasses

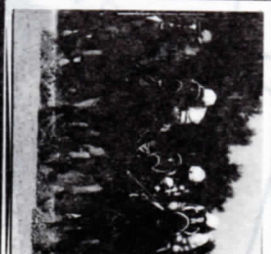
