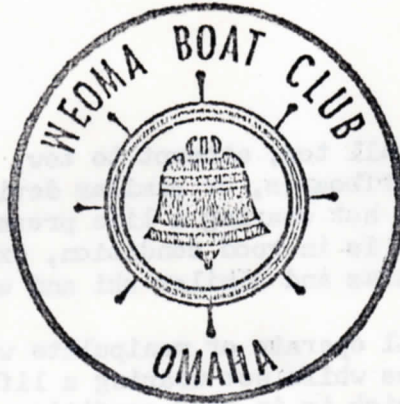

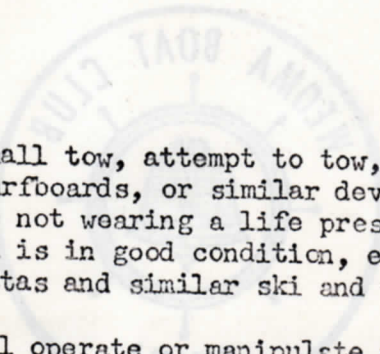

DID YOU KNOW THAT IT IS UNLAWFUL

- . . . To operate or give permission for the operation of a vessel which is not equipped as required.
- . . . To exceed the speed posted or charted in any specific zone or area. Under all other circumstances speed must be reasonable and proper in consideration of the prevailing conditions.
- . . . To operate vessels within an area marked off or set aside as a prohibited area.
- . . . No person or persons shall operate any vessel or operate or manipulate water skis, surf boards, or similar devices so as to cause discomfort, hazard or damage to the person or property of others.
- . . . To operate any vessel or manipulate any water skis, surfboards, or similar devices while intoxicated or under the influence of any drug or barbituate.
- . . . To tow or otherwise be assisting a person on water skis, aquaplane, or similar device from the period of one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise unless a duly-authorized competition.
- . . . To place, or leave, in any public waters, any boat not safe for operation.
- . . . To allow children under 12 aboard any vessel when not wearing a Coast Guard approved life preserver except when hunting waterfowl in an anchored boat. Operators of boats shall be held responsible for compliance with this regulation.



- • • No operator shall tow, attempt to tow, or assist any person on water skis, surfboards, or similar devices while that person or persons are not wearing a life preserver, buoyant vest, or ski belt which is in good condition, except during state-approved regattas and similar ski and water shows.
- • • No person shall operate or manipulate water skis, surfboards, or similar devices while not wearing a life preserver, buoyant vest, or ski belt which is in good condition, except during state-approved regattas and similar ski and water shows.
- • • No one under 14 shall operate motorboats of any class at any time. Owners of boats shall be held responsible for compliance with this regulation.
- • • Loading of vessels shall not exceed reasonable, proper, and seamanlike standards. No overloaded vessel shall be operated on the waters of this state. All boats when loaded must retain at least one-third of the total depth of the boat above the water when measured at the center of the boat.

TRAILERS AND THEIR EFFECT ON CAR OPERATION

It should be recognized by trailer owners that passenger cars are intended primarily for passenger conveyance. They have been designed to carry a driver, passengers, and normal luggage load, and a sufficient safety factor has been incorporated in the structural design of the cars for this purpose. The additional load imposed on a car by trailer use is not considered in fundamental designs, mainly because most car makers do not assume that any appreciable percentage of owners will tow trailers with their cars. A car specifically designed to tow a trailer will not compare favorably with the product built to satisfy the average owner of a motor car.

When a trailer is attached to the rear of a car, the car is changed from a load-carrying vehicle to a load-pulling vehicle. The demands of this type of operation are very different from those for which the automobile was designed and are quite certain to present problems in spring and tire loading, braking, cooling, lighting, steering and in operating economy which are not encountered when the car carries its rated load on its own four wheels.

The use of a passenger car for towing trailers is usually not considered as normal use. Consequently, cars used for this purpose may not be protected under the warranty if in the dealer's opinion the life of any particular part is affected by trailer loads.

Pickup trailers or other light types may readily be pulled by a passenger car with any well-designed detachable hitch. Hitches fastened to the rear bumper are not recommended. The hitch for these trailers must not attach to the rear bumper or frame rear crossmember, but must be designed to distribute the strains of the load and pull to the frame side members directly. Since there are many types, weights, and sizes of trailers, and numerous trailer hitch designs, each having its individual performance characteristics, it is impossible to thoroughly evaluate the merits of each.

Since most boat owners and many other motor vehicle owners will utilize their cars for towing trailers, we wish to point out those items which may be affected by such operation in order that proper attention may be given to them.

1. SPRINGS The portion of the trailer weight which is supported by the car will, of course, depress the rear springs beyond their designed position, will reduce wheel and axle clearance, and if excessive may overstress and break springs. Therefore, booster springs or heavier rear springs having sufficient capacity to carry the additional weight imposed on the car's rear axle by the trailer should be installed when the weight exceeds that resultant from a five passenger load.

2. TRANSMISSION The transmission and all power train units will have an increased load placed upon them by continuous or long distance towing of large trailers, and it is probable that the service life of such units as transmission, rear axle, clutch, etc., will be shortened. Automatic transmissions have been quite successful in pulling trailers and have the additional advantage of very noticeably curtailing driver fatigue by automatically selecting the correct power ratio needed. However, it is reasonable to assume that the service life of automatic transmissions will also be decreased (by continuous trailer towing) below that normally expected for straight passenger car service.
3. TIRES If a trailer which adds materially to the load on the rear tires is to be hauled, the local tire dealer should be consulted for proper tire size and pressure as well as wheel rim size. Overloading will, of course, reduce the life of any tire and, if excessive, may be an accident hazard because of the increased danger of blowouts.
4. BRAKES The brakes on most cars are adequate for the car's weight and speed and are designed for satisfactory durability when used as intended to stop the car itself. They must not be expected to assume, without penalty, the additional duty imposed by a heavy trailer. A trailer of any size larger than a pickup type should have its own brakes. Most manufacturers recommend against tapping hydraulic brake systems of trailers into the car brake system. However, many modern trailers have mechanical/hydraulically actuated brakes which give satisfactory results.
5. ELECTRIC SYSTEM Consideration should be given to the electrical system capacity because state laws normally require a trailer to have side and rear clearance lights. This extra load, if used at the same time as the normal car electrical accessories, will probably exceed the output of a standard generator. Therefore, for continuous trailer towing, a heavy-duty generator should be installed. The driver should be aware that the car's headlamp pattern will be raised if the rear of the car is forced downward by the weight of the trailer, and may prove annoying or hazardous to approaching cars. If a trailer is used continuously, the headlamps should be readjusted to the correct level with the car loaded as it will be driven. If attached to the car only occasionally, the city driving position of the headlight beams may be adequate for all conditions.
6. COOLING The engine cooling system should be adequate. However, close attention should be given to engine operating temperature, especially on mountain grades. If overheating develops, it may be necessary to install: a higher gear reduction ratio in the rear axle where available, a larger radiator, a radiator pressure cap, or faster fan rotation, for continuous towing of large trailers.

7. HANDLING When operating a car with a trailer attached, the driver must realize that the steering characteristics and braking distance of his passenger car have been altered considerable and he must exercise greater caution and safety in handling his car and trailer. With proper and adequate consideration of all the factors involved, most cars are capable of pulling trailers without undue deterioration.
