Participation in the contest began at a slow pace, but picked up steadily as the May 29 deadline approached. Twelve winners were selected, one for each calendar month, and four were given honorable mentions.

In addition to the honor of having their art work displayed on the 1992 Quality calendars in full color, each winner received a \$100. U.S. Savings Bond and a \$25.00 gift certificate to Standard Blue Artworld. Their photos will accompany their art work on the calendars which will be distributed to all employees during October, National Quality Month.

Judging the entries were Madelyn Bruning of the Millard South High School art department; Jerry Pabst, art coordinator, Omaha Public Schools; and John Thien, Fine and Performing Arts director at Creighton University.
