# Pioneers Install New Officers for Chapter

President Richard Schaben welcomed the guests at the thirteenth annual assembly of the Cornhusker Chapter at the Ramada Inn Central on Friday, June 14. Approximately 150 Telephone Pioneers of America and their Partners were in attendance to witness the installation of officers for 1991-92.

Schaben, whose term officially expires on June 30, presented a 9-minute tape depicting the various activities of the chapter and its accomplishments of the past year. He re-stated the goals of 1990-91 and thanked everyone involved who helped attain them.

"Every time a Pioneer volunteer project is completed, and there have been many, the community is the ultimate winner," said Schaben.

The outgoing president noted in his remarks that the volunteer hours for the Cornhusker Chapter will wxceed 100,000 hours for the fiscal year ending June, 1991. This represents over 30 hours per year for each Works employee.

One of the most gratifying experiences of his term was the ability of the Chapter to bring the Turkeyfest dinner to over 950 elderly citizens and street people. This number more than triples earlier achievements, according to Schaben.

Following Schaben's opening presentation was the invocation by Life Member Representative Tom Baye. Entertainment was provided by "Collectors Choice", a women's barbershop quartet.

Also addressing the gathering was Sharon Martin, president of the Nebraska State Reading Council. She presented the chapter with the Nebraska Celebrate Literacy Award for its efforts in recording tapes and distributing them to the elderly.

J. W. Carter, Works vice president, gave the main address of the evening. Les Watts, vice president of Region 3, TPA, swore in the new officers for the 1991-1992 year. Leo Thietje will take office as president on July 1; Jim Kelly, senior vice president; and Harvey Palmer, vice president. Baye and Pat Nowak will continue in their terms as Life Member Representatives.



# Label Lingo

Food labels are designed to be attractive and informative, yet sometimes the information can be confusing.

Terms such as "lite" or "light," "natural," or "organic" have no standard definitions and are often misleading to unsuspecting consumers.

The following list of legal definitions will help you make informed food choices by making you a more confident label reader.


- Lean: No more than 10% fat by weight not by calories.
- Extra Lean: No more than 5% fat by weight not by calories.
- Leaner: At least 25% less fat (by weight) than the original product.
- Dietetic: One or more ingredient (usually sodium or sugar) has been changed, substituted or restricted. Not necessarily low in calories.
- Sugar-free/Sugarless: Contains no sucrose (table sugar), but might contain corn syrup, fructose, honey, sorbital or other sweeteners. Not necessarily low in calories.

Low Salt

- Very Low Sodium: No more than 35 mg sodium per serving.
- Low Sodium: No more than 140 mg sodium per serving.
- Reduced Sodium: At least 25% less sodium than the original product.
- No Salt Added and Salt-Free: No salt added in processing. However, the food could have significant amounts of natural sodium, or sodium from other sources such as soy sauce or preservatives.
- Low in Calories: No more than 40 calories per serving and no more than 0.4 calories per gram.
- Reduced Calorie: One-third fewer calories than the product it most resembles, except meat and poultry which must contain 25% fewer calories than similar products.
- No Cholesterol: Currently, no legal definition. Remember, though, that a product labeled no or low cholesterol may still contain saturated fats that raise blood cholesterol, and that this label does not mean "no fat".
- Enriched: The replacement of nutrients lost in the manufacturing process. Most common is the addition of vitamins B<sub>1</sub>, B<sub>2</sub>, B<sub>3</sub> and iron to refined grain.
- Fortified: The addition of nutrients to foods that did not originally contain them. The additions of vitamins A and D to milk, iodine to salt, and vitamins or minerals to cereals are examples.






