What's So Special About



Father's Day, June 16



Most historians credit Sonora Dodd, of Washington state, for starting the Father's Day tradition. She heard a Mother's Day sermon in 1909 and wanted a day to honor her father, a Civil War veteran who raised six children alone after the death of his wife. Dodd chose June 19th, her father's birthday. Others contend that Grace Golden Clayton of Fairmont, W. Va., launched the first Father's Day. Her own father, a Methodist minister, had died in 1896. She still missed his quidance and was considering hosting a special tribute to him around Independence Day. Then, in December of 1907, a local mine explosion killed 360 miners, leaving 250 widows and more than 1,000 fatherless children. That event led Clayton to celebrate what many consider the first Father's Day, on July 5, 1908. "It was partly the explosion that set me to think how important and loved most fathers are, " she said.

"All those lonely little children and heartbroken widows in a matter of a few minutes. How sad and frightening to have no father, no husband, to turn to at such an awful time."

National Iced Tea Month, June 1-30. Iced tea was first sold in 1904 at the St. Louis World's Fair. A tea importer had hoped to win new customers with free samples of hot tea, but a heat wave eliminated the public's interest, so he dumped ice into the drink and a new beverage was born.

Donald Duck's birthday, June 9. On this day in 1934, Donald Duck made his debut in the cartoon, "The Wise Little Hen." He has appeared in 128 cartoons and 42 short features -more than any other Disney character.

National Flag Week, June 9-15. Millions of American flags have been sold since September 11th. Two days after the terrorist attacks, the U.S. House of Representatives passed a resolution asking every American to fly the flag for 30 days to show the world that "we as Americans remain great and free. " Many Canadians also bought and flew U.S. flags to show their support.

Solar Eclipse, June 10. This annular eclipse -- where the moon is completely ringed by the sun -- will begin at 4:51 p.m. Eastern Daylight Time and will end at 10:36. It will be visible in the United States, Canada, northern Mexico, and parts of Australia and Asia.

Start of Summer, June
21. Summer is still the most popular time to vacation. A Gallup survey shows that 33 percent of adults say that summer is the "perfect" vacation time, followed by 27 percent who like the fall; 21 percent, the spring; and 19 percent, winter time.

Hot tubs are relaxing, but they can be dangerous if used improperly. Here are some safety tips from the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission:

- Don't sit in water hotter than 104 degrees Fahrenheit. A temperature of 100 degrees is considered safe for a healthy adult. Be especially careful about exposing young children to hot temperatures.
- · Don't soak and drink. Too much alcohol can lead to drowsiness, unconsciousness, and drowning.
- Stay out of the tub if you are taking medications that cause drowsiness, such as tranquilizers, antihistamines, or anticoagulants.
- Pregnant women beware! Soaking in water above 102 degrees Fahrenheit can cause fetal damage during the first three months of pregnancy.
 - Talk to your doctor before using a hot tub if you have a history of heart disease, circulatory problems, diabetes, or blood pressure problems.

The Inventor of Television

The father of modern television was Philo T. Farnsworth, a farm boy from Idaho, who, legend has it, thought of the idea at 13 while he was tilling a potato field, back and forth, with a horse-drawn harrow. He realized that an electron beam could scan images the same way, line by line, and in 1927, while he was a student at Brigham Young University, he was the first to transmit a television image made up of 60 horizontal lines. Appropriately, the image he transmitted was a dollar sign. But ultimately Farnsworth became disenchanted with how his invention was being used, telling his son, "There's nothing on it worthwhile, and we're not going to watch it in this household, and I don't want it in your intellectual diet."






