Every month an average of 60 children enter the foster care system in the Omaha metropolitan area. They are infants, youth and teenagers. They are children who have been abused and neglected. They are children in crisis.

Children who enter foster care come from backgrounds as diverse as the population of Douglas and Sarpy counties. They could be the children next door. They could be relatives.

With 1,250 children in out-of-home care, but only 500 foster homes in which to place them, the Omaha Metro District of the Nebraska Department of Social Services faces a foster care crisis daily and seeks your help. Quality foster homes are a premium.

By investing in a child's life, foster parents are able to make a difference, not only for that child, but eventually for the community.

Perhaps this poem, a favorite among foster parents, explains it best:

"A hundred years from now
it will not matter what our bank account was,
the sort of house we lived in,

because we were important in the life of a child

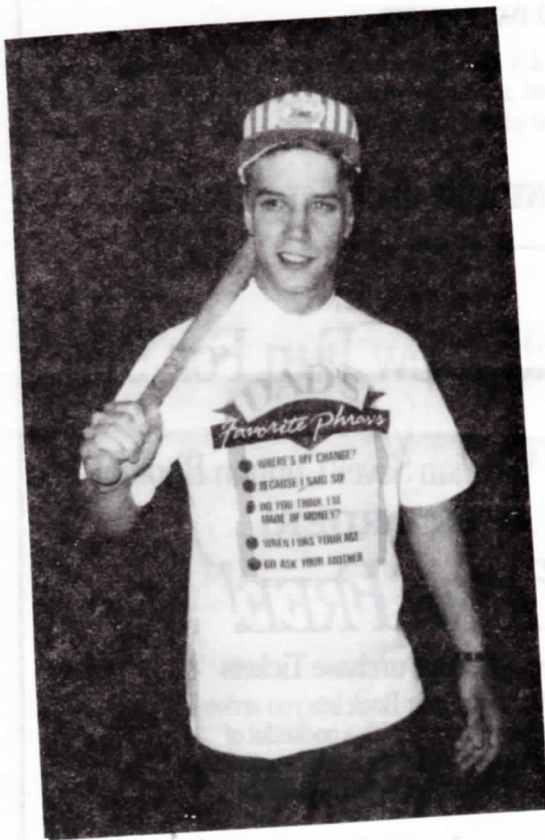

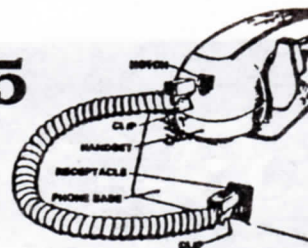
