The Art of Making Knives is Demonstrated by Chuck Syslo

The April meeting of the Weoma Sportsmen's Club featured Chuck Syslo, a tool and die maker in Dept. 704-2. Syslo provided the members in attendance with an interesting and informative talk about

the art of knife making.




He started making knives about 32 years ago by shaping used power hacksaw blades on a grinder. Since that time he has progressed to the point of making knives which are considered display and collector items.

SYSLO

Syslo was accepted as a member of the Knife Makers Guild about ten years ago. The makers have to meet certain criteria and demonstrate skills necessary to become a member.

The types of steel Syslo uses for knives is 440c, 154cm, ATS 34 or D2. Steel bar stock is ordered from a knife maker supply house. The stock is sawed out to match a pattern. Next, it is rough shaped on a mill and grinder. The blade is then sent to a company (usually one in California) to be heat treated which hardens the blade. After this process the blade is fine sanded and polished until the desired finish is reached. This is the most time consuming part of knife making.

After the polishing is finished, the handle is attached. All holes or taps for the handle attach(continued next column)



ments are finished before the blade is hardened. Handle materials vary from wood micartas and sambar stag to exotic woods and ivory.

The knives Syslo makes carry the name "Cisco". If you have any questions concerning knives, call him at 333-0647. The Sportsmen's Club thanks Chuck for his fine presentation.
