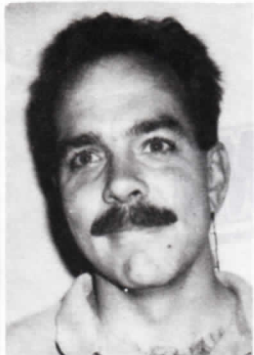

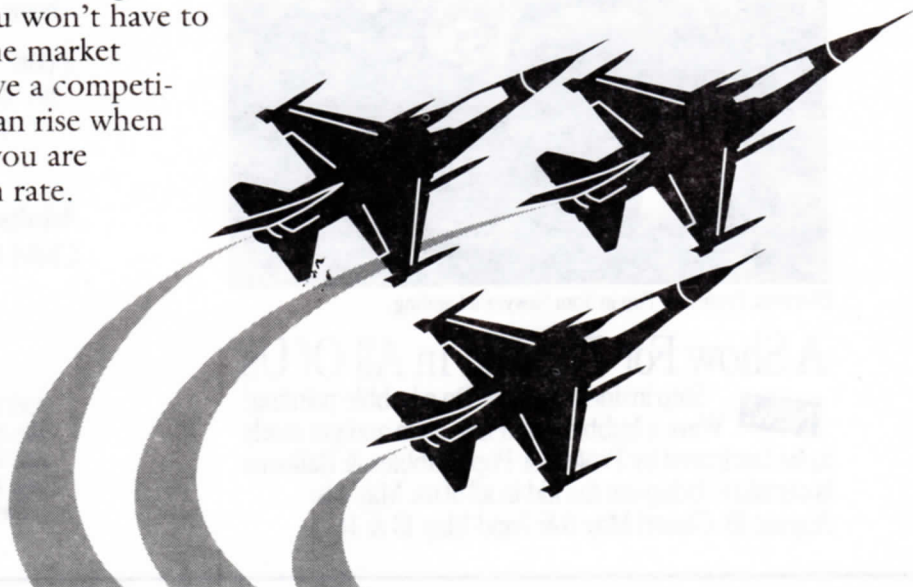

## Bowlers Assist Big Brothers/Sisters

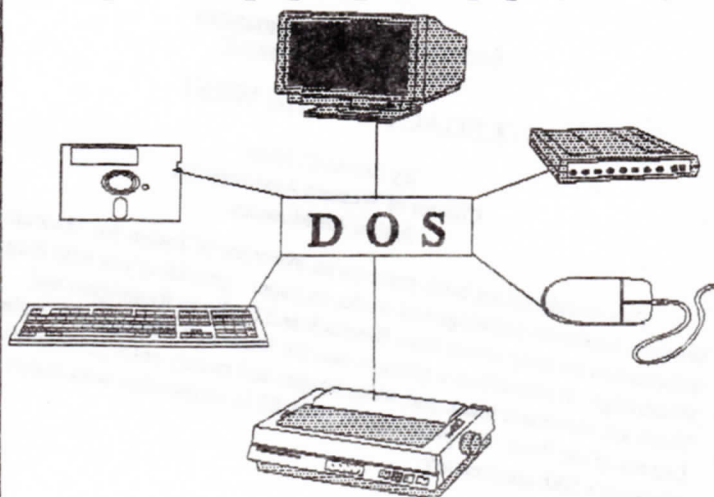
