What's So Special About



THANKSGIVING

Although the first Thanksgiving in the United States was the Pilgrim's harvest celebration in 1621, the custom was not given official government recognition for 320 years. During that time, Thanksgiving was celebrated in different parts of the country at various times throughout the year. In 1777, the Continental Congress declared the first national Thanksgiving and set the date in December for the next five years. President George Washington revived the holiday in 1789, and Presidents John Adams and James Madison continued the custom, although none of those celebrations occurred in autumn. During the Civil War, it was not possible to find a consensus on a date. Abraham Lincoln declared national Thanksgivings in April and August to commemorate military victories of the North.

Sarah Hale, a New England author and magazine editor, lobbied the federal government for years to establish the day as a national holiday with a constant date. In 1863, Lincoln obliged, setting the annual celebration for the last Thursday in November, a precedent followed by every president since. During the Depression, President Roosevelt hoped to extend the Christmas buying season by holding Thanksgiving a week earlier during 1939 to 1941. The move did little to boost store sales, though, and the public outcry at "Franksgiving" was so great that he later signed legislation permanently establishing Thanksgiving on the fourth Thursday of November.

Aviation History Month, Nov. 1-30.

November was the month in 1782 in which French brothers, Joseph and Jacques Montgolfier, experimented with filling paper and fabric bags with hot air, a step that led to the first hot air balloon and the science of flight. Also in this month, on Nov. 5, 1911, Calbraith Rodgers was the first to fly coast to coast across America.

Veterans' Day, Nov. 11. Following World War I, the United States established Armistice Day to honor the soldiers who fought and died in that war. In 1953, the townspeople of Emporia, Kansas, renamed the day "Veterans' Day" in gratitude to the veterans in their town who had been killed or injured in World War II. Soon after, Congress passed a bill to adopt the name for the national holiday that now honors veterans of all American wars.

Remembrance Day

Canadians observe Remembrance Day, also known as Armistice Day, on November 11, a holiday that corresponds to Veterans' Day in the United States. Remembrance Day commemorates the signing of the armistice that ended World War I on Nov. 11, 1918, and pays tribute to those who died in all of Canada's wars. Many Canadians wear poppies to honor the war dead, a tradition that was inspired by the poem, "In Flanders Field," written by Canadian Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae after the Battle of Ypres in Belgium during World War I. The poem expresses the fear of fallen soldiers that they will be forgotten. Its first lines are: "In Flanders fields the poppies blow/Between the crosses, row on row/That mark our place." Proceeds from the sales of Remembrance Day poppies go to veterans' organizations.

Lighting of the Rockefeller Center

Christmas Tree, last week of November. Each November, the Center's gardens manager scours the Northeast in a helicopter looking for just the right Norway spruce. When he finds a tree that is well-shaped and approximately 80 feet tall and 40 feet wide, he asks the owners to donate their tree. It is decorated with 30,000 lights.


Dealing with Tinnitus

Tinnitus, the condition characterized by a constant ringing in the ears, affects nearly 36 million Americans. Ear specialists say some cases are caused by a build up of earwax or as a side effect of certain medications. If a thorough ear canal cleaning doesn't work, see a doctor for a change in medication because tinnitus is sometimes an indicator of another illness, such as anemia or diabetes. To get temporary relief, limit your intake of caffeine, alcohol, nicotine, and aspirin. Listening to music at a low volume will also help mask the ringing.

An Apple a Day ...

... keeps the doctor away, the old saying goes. And new research backs up the claim. Eating apples regularly can benefit your heart, lungs, and digestion. Apples are rich in antioxidants, which can lower cholesterol and help prevent heart disease and cancer. Cornell University researchers found that a medium-sized apple provides the antioxidant activity equivalent to 1,500 milligrams of vitamin C. Apples also contain significant amounts of quercetin, a nutrient that researchers have found can reduce the risk of lung cancer. And a medium apple contains five grams of fiber, more than you'll find in a serving of oatmeal. Fiber helps maintain healthy digestion and also has been shown to lower cholesterol.

The Combined Federal Campaign is more stringent, requiring that groups spend no more than 25 percent on expenses not directly related to their charitable objectives. The Internal Revenue Service requires nonprofits to make their Form 990 tax returns where you can determine their spending practices readily available; and legitimate charities will gladly mail these to you or direct you to websites that have this information.


