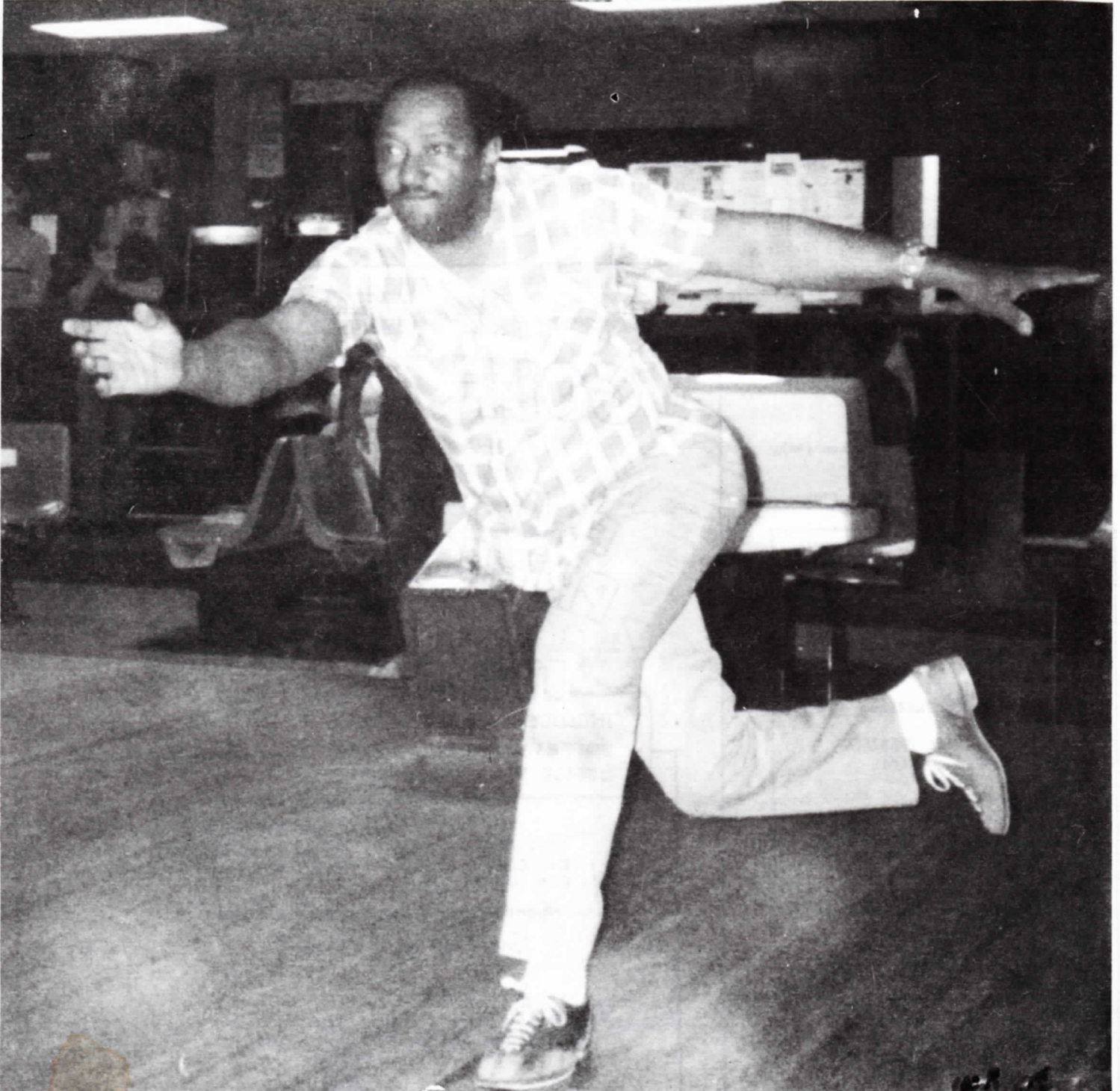

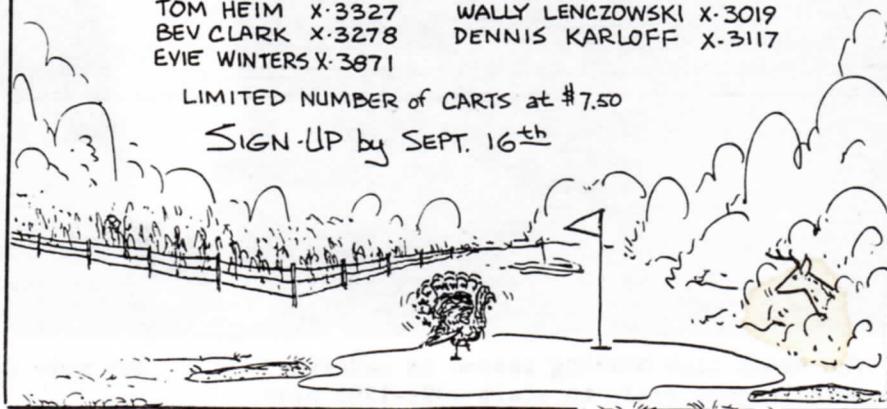

TLC Notes-

Diarrhea and dehydration

❖ Besides making you miserable, diarrhea can cause the loss of body fluids and electrolytes (eg, sodium and potassium) that your body needs to keep working. Such dehydration can progress to disorientation and loss of vital body functions. This is especially dangerous and rapid in infants, small children, the infirm, and the elderly.

How can you tell if someone is getting dehydrated?

With dehydration, urination decreases, thirst increases, the skin becomes dry, and the person feels tired and light-headed. (In infants, tears decrease; depression of the "soft spot" on the top of the head is a serious danger sign.)

What should you do for diarrhea and dehydration?

Try to prevent dehydration by drinking your usual amount of liquids plus the amount lost in watery stools and vomiting. Call your doctor if severe vomiting prevents oral intake. Try to drink enough liquids so that you urinate about as often as usual.

It is extremely important to replace lost fluids and electrolytes, report any signs of dehydration, and control further losses.

- Infants. Special solutions (eg, Pedialyte, Resol) are made to precisely replace fluids and electrolytes in infants and young children. Use these products undiluted and unsweetened. Call your doctor if a child can't, or won't,

drink plenty of these fluids.

- Older children and adults. A good combination for short-term use is non-fat chicken broth, perhaps a little orange juice, and plenty of water. Chicken broth alone has too much sodium, some fruit juices (eg, prune, grape, apple) may make diarrhea worse, and water alone contains no electrolytes.

Diarrhea is often caused by an infection, so unless you are advised otherwise, stay away from others, at least until diarrhea subsides. And wash your hands carefully, especially after using the toilet.

What should you avoid and what should you eat?

Avoid milk products, fruits, and foods that are greasy, high in fiber, or very sweet. When diarrhea begins to subside, you can eat mild, easy-to-digest foods (eg, bananas, plain rice, boiled potatoes, toast, soda crackers, cooked carrots), which will provide the electrolytes you need. Other mild foods, such as baked chicken (with no skin or fat) may be added as you improve.

What danger signs are reasons to call your doctor?

Be sure to call your doctor if you have fever, intense or persistent abdominal pain, ongoing diarrhea, blood in the stools, severe vomiting, or any suspicion of dehydration.

- ✓ During 1990, 262 people died and 23,288 were injured in traffic accidents in Nebraska.
- ✓ One collision occurs every 12.7 minutes in Nebraska.
- ✓ One in every 16 licensed drivers in Nebraska will be involved in a motor vehicle collision each year.
- ✓ Motor vehicle accidents in which people are injured or killed cost Nebraska over \$680,000,000 annually using FHWA figures for societal costs.
- ✓ Motor vehicle collisions are the #1 cause of death for people 44 years and younger.
- ✓ During 1990, 64 people were injured daily in motor vehicle collisions in Nebraska, and one person was killed every 33 hours.
- ✓ Safety belts cut your chances of being killed or seriously injured in a crash by 40 - 55 percent.

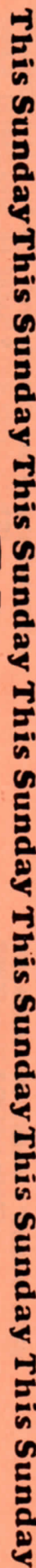

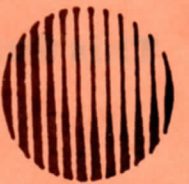
