## 1971 Omaha Works UCS Drive Set for Oct. 5-9

"If you don't do it, it won't get done."

That is the theme of the Heart of the Midlands United Appeal for 1971. It could also be the theme for the United Fund campaign at the Omaha Works.

The Heart of the Midlands United Fund campaign will be kicked-off at the Omaha Works on October 5 and will continue through October 9. During that

week, every Omaha Works employee will be contacted individually and asked to contribute his Fair Share to the United Fund.

The goal this year at the Omaha Works is \$215,000, according to Herb Hickman, Assistant Manager of Organization 320, who is heading the United Fund drive at the Omaha Works.

"We're shooting for 100 per cent participation in the United Fund this year," Hickman said. "Since 1968, we have had 60 to 80 per cent participation in our United Fund drives, but achieving 100 per cent will be a big job."

He is right, it will be a big job, but United Fund performs a big service to the community. Your Fair Share contribution goes to support some 50 agencies and organizations throughout the Omaha-Council Bluffs metropolitan area. United Fund officials said money pledged reaches agencies such as Legal Aid Societies, Boys' Clubs, Boy Scouts, the Salvation Army, the Red Cross and the YM and YWCA's.

The Omaha Works' goal of \$215,000 is just part of the total Heart of the Midlands United Appeal. The total goal is \$3.6 million, up from a goal of \$3.5 million last year. Giving your Fair Share means a contribution of one hours' base pay per month.

By contributing to the United Fund, you are really supporting some fifty organizations in the Omaha-Council Bluffs area. Less than five cents of every dollar given to the United Fund is spent on administrative and campaign costs.

## **W. E. Buys Site Near Chicago, Ill.**

W. E. announced the purchase of 160 acres of land near Naperville, Ill. for the future construction of an electric-type telephone communications plant. Naperville is about 30 miles west of downtown Chicago.

W. E. President, Harvey G. Mehlhouse, stated that purchase of the site is a part of the Company's long-range plan to meet the communications equipment needs of the Bell operating companies.

He added, "This will provide additional growth for Western Electric in the Chicago area. No employees will be transferred from existing locations for whatever activity might develop at this new site. Our Hawthorne plant will remain the center of our activity there."

Currently, the Chicago area has one of the largest concentrations of WE employees in the nation with about 40,000 workers at six major locations.

Mr. Mehlhouse said the company will ask the Dupage County Zoning Board to rezone the property, located about two miles southwest of Naperville and four miles southwest of the Bell Laboratories.

### **Set for October 12**

The Benefit Service Organization has announced that the Blue Cross-Blue Shield semi-annual enrollment period for the Hospital-Surgical-Medical Plan has been set for October 12 thru October 26.

At this time employees may enroll in the H-S-M Plan or change coverage. These dates are of particular interest to employees with less than six months service, employees desiring a sponsored individual contract for unmarried children ages 19 thru 22 or employees desiring to change from individual to family coverage.

Premiums of \$16.36 and \$36.60, respectively for individual and family contracts apply only to those employees with less than six months of service with the Company. At the time the employee reaches six months of service, the Company will assume the total cost of the insurance.

# Production Stopped as Annual Inventory Taken of Shop Merchandise on September 26

Green dodgers, pink dodgers, 10.08's, OH 23-9's and tally sheets are all familiar terms about this time of year.

On the last fiscal weekend of September (September 26, this year), all pro-

duction stopped and the annual physical inventory of shop merchandise began. All raw materials, piece parts, expense supplies and manufactured goods in process were counted and weighed to verify the

quantities of each on hand.

Taking the annual inventory is no small task. Preparations for the inventory began in July, but the inventory will not be finalized until mid-January of 1971. Although everything was inventoried on September 26, the results must yet be tabulated, recorded and a thousand other details taken care of before the inventory is officially considered concluded. Ultimately in mid-January, the ledgers will be adjusted to agree with the amounts of merchandise on hand and with that the books will be closed for 1970.

Successfully taking an inventory depends on the efforts of people from several departments. The Business Methods Department determines the method of taking the inventory. The Accounting Department is responsible for actually taking the inventory, but it is the people in the shops who work with the materials to be inventoried, who weigh and count the material. When the counting and weighing are completed, the data processing organization tabulates the results of the inventory.

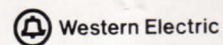
When the results have been tabulated, the accounting department balances the ledgers to agree with the amounts of material on hand, and the inventory is complete.

The annual inventory is nothing unique to the Omaha Works. Other Western Electric locations across the country were involved in the same activity last weekend.
