Works Tackles Attendance Problem

Following an intensive seven-month study, the Omaha Works has developed and will soon implement a new Attendance Control Program.

To become effective on Monday, July 26, the Omaha Works Attendance Control Program has been designed to more effectively deal with attendance problems while at the same time providing more adequate recognition for those with positive attendance records.

This new program replaces the previous Absence Control Program which has been in effect at the Omaha Works since the early 1960's.

"Our concern is with the number of days absent," explained Gene Tingwald, assistant manager, 510.

"It's all too well-known that the Omaha Works currently holds the dubious distinction of having the worst attendance record in the entire Company. Specifically, the Works last year recorded an average of 17.2 days of absence per employee, a figure that cost the Company nearly \$2½ million in absence payments alone. That's not even counting the additional costs incurred when, as a direct result of absenteeism, we add people to the roll, retrain or move others and suffer a loss in efficiency."

ACP Chairman Bob Tatten, assistant manager, 440, added, "A poor attend-

ance record can adversely influence the Omaha Works' competitive stance within the Company. Recognizing this, we have worked to develop some effective countermeasures to our attendance problems. As it now stands, we have an average of over 300 people absent every single working day. We all know that is a statistic that can't be tolerated much longer."

Details of the new program are currently being given to all supervisors and will be distributed to all remaining employees immediately following Standard Vacation.

Department 273 Sets Pace With Record-Breaking Savings

Records are being set as the Omaha Works reaches the half-way point in its 1976 Engineering Cost Reduction Program.

Well on the way to meeting its \$7 million goal, the program got a sizable boost in May when Department 273 set a record by being the first department to ever exceed \$2 million in cost reduction savings.

As of May 1, the department had recorded \$2,161,000 in savings, well exceeding their pre-established goal of \$1,800,000.

A great deal of the credit for Depart-

ment 273's record-setting savings goes to the granulator project headed by Works Senior Engineer John Dinovo. As mentioned in a previous Westerner article, the granulator's primary job is to separate plastic insulation from copper wire so the Omaha Works can sell the copper and plastic at a higher price than was previously possible through the use of outside sources.

The granulator project netted \$1,485,000 in savings, 10% of which is credited to Department 731 for the engineering and construction of the

The advance pay for the remaining vacation days, less estimated taxes, will be a separate payment on June 25 which may be more or less than the authorized regular midmonth advance. There will be no scheduled mid-month advance in July for those employees taking Standard Vacation . . .

facilities under the supervision of Senior Engineers Clay Higginson and John Stenstrom.

Senior Engineer John Peterson, Department 733, headed a project that contributed \$108,600 to this year's cost reduction program. This particular cost reduction case involved centralizing in-Plant temperature controls in the boiler house so that heating and cooling systems can be put into operation according to actual temperature requirements as well as actual building occupation periods.

A savings of \$43,300 was credited to a case conducted by Department 472 Senior Engineer Jack Davis and Planning Engineer Tom Blair. The savings came from the substitution of less expensive resistors in the 4A plugin trunk units.

Industrial engineering personnel in the 520 Organization participate in the Cost Reduction Program in a supportive role, providing the time studies and back up work necessary for the realization of the Works' cost reduction objectives.




